## Drive safely July 4th weekend

The Fourth of July weekend will bring fun, fireworks... and more 300 highway fatalities.

Statistics coldly, but clearly tell the recent tale of highway tragedy. Last year, 635 died in highway accidents during the July 4th weekend.

The "National Safety Council" reports that an additional 215 people have died since who were involved in auto accidents last July 4th weekend.

The smart driver is the one who will concentrate on the estimated 20 driving decisions which must be made each mile. To help the smart driver, an Insurance Company suggests five basic tenets of a Decision Driving program which the firm has taught throughout the country:

- 1. size up the whole scene
- 2. signal intentions early
- 3. plan an escape route
- 4. take decisive action
- 5. expand your look-ahead capacity simply means to watch for potentially dangerous situations developing ahead on the road.

A problem developing hundreds of yards ahead could be a full grown hazard for you in just a few seconds. The time gained by early recognition of potential problems could add a lot of time to your life.

In sizing up the whole scene, a driver evaluates his total environment, as it is constantly changing. Changes in weather, visibility, traffic patterns, road conditions and such demand immediate and accurate response, especially when driving at high speeds.

Even the best decision may be of no value if the driver does not communicate with other drivers.

office about 45 days after the teams begin operating.

In their own jurisdictions, "our people from each post will be talking with local officials about the program in the near future," he said.

In addition, Norworthy said that each post's trooper public information officer would keep the local news media advised in advance of the enforcement team's general location on a regular basis, both to alert the public about their presence in a particular county and to permit the spot news coverage of their activities.

The first statewide evaluation of the teams' impact on the traffic accident rate is expected to be delivered to the governor's "board in" on both the adjoining traffic lanes.

Finally, the driver must be ready to take decisive action. If the driver has kept in mind the above four principles, his decision-making should be that of the driver who concentrates on his driving environment, to make decisions which will help get him where he is going.
