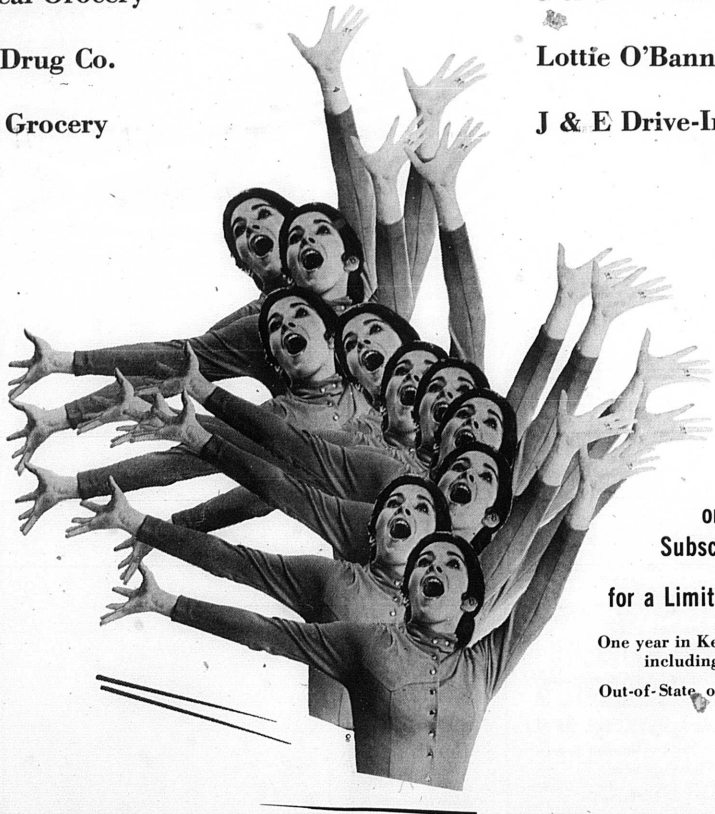

convention tonight

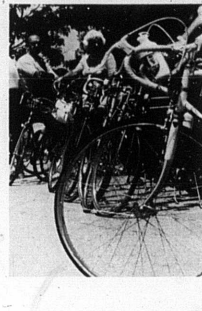
The 54th Annual Department

building.

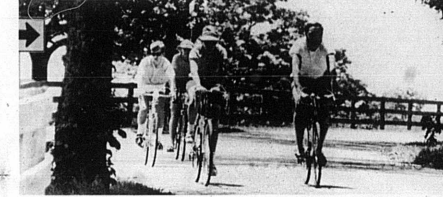
The concluding entertainment

COUNTY FAIRS  
REMAIN POPULAR

By itself... one worth seeking  
out sometime this summer.

From early June through late  
fall can be considered county fair  
time in Kentucky, and these edu-  
cational and fun-filled events con-  
tinue to be popular with the peo-  
ple.

Kentucky has a long history in  
county fairs, having made many  
contributions to the development  
of local fairs. Since the early  
educational and fun-filled events con-  
tinue to be popular with the peo-  
ple.

The money is allocated on a  
matching basis (up to a \$2,000  
maximum) which gives local  
groups a greater incentive to sup-  
port their fair. Since the program  
started, the amount of money of-  
fered for agricultural premiums  
has greatly increased, as has the  
number of approved classes.

Last year, the Department,  
through its Division of Shows and  
Fairs, provided some \$79,000 to  
the 64 fairs which participated in  
the program. All of the fairs did  
with quality for the maximum  
amount.

It is a credit to local leader-  
ship that our fairs continue to  
remain strong. A good fair can  
be educational to exhibitors and  
spectators alike. In addition, a  
fair can serve to mold commu-  
nity spirit.
