The appointment of Col. Wilbur Robert Buntin Jr. of Carlisle as deputy adjutant general of Kentucky was announced Thursday by Adj. Gen. Richard L. Frymire, Frankfort.

Col. Buntin began his military career in Sept. 1942 as a private and was commissioned a second lieutenant in Combat Engineers in May, 1943. While serving in the Pacific Theater of Operations, he participated in the New Guinea and Luzon campaigns.

He joined the Kentucky National Guard in 1946 as a captain in the Carlisle unit and has risen through the ranks to his present grade.

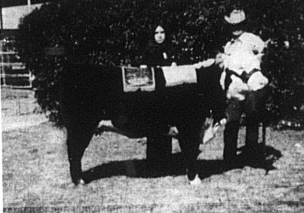
Prior to his present military assignment as commander of the 138th Artillery Group, Lexington, he was the commander of the 204th Engineer Battalion, Ashland.

Girl Scouts to attend worship services; diversified camping program offered and annual cookie sale begins here today

The annual cookie sale of the Wilderess Road Girl Scout Council, which includes Nicholas County, will begin March 9, and continue through April 1, according to Mrs. Charles Gates, local chairman.

Nicholas County Girl Scouts will be among the 12,000 girls in the 37 county Council area who will attempt to sell a total of 250,000 boxes of cookies during the 1972 sale.

Funds raised from the annual sale will be used for an outdoor program and camp development. The Council has five camp sites in the 37 county area—for the benefit of all girls in the Council.

Additionally, 7.5 cents from each box will go to the girl's own troop for use for troop purposes.

Cookies will sell for 75 cents a box and butter shorties, chocolate mint, peanut butter sandwich, assorted sandwich and pacanettes will be offered.

The cookie sale will overlap the Wilderess Road Council's celebration of Girl Scout Week, March 12-18, marking the 60th anniversary of the founding of the Girl Scouts of the U.S.A.

The Council, with headquarters in Lexington, serves 35 counties in Central and Eastern Kentucky plus one each in Ohio and Tennessee.

For the first time this year, the Wilderess Road Council will have an exchange program with four other Councils, allowing local girls to attend their camps at no increased rates.

Camps available under this exchange are Meadowick, Sandy Bend and Ann Blakey in West Virginia and Kwanitama in Virginia.

The two Wilderess Road camps registered a total of 74 girls during the 1971 summer camping season and an even larger number is anticipated this year.

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Feed grain sign-up ends Friday

Harvey Wagner, chairman of the Nicholas County ASC Committee, reminds all Nicholas County farmers that the sign-up period for the 1972 Wheat and Feed Grain Programs ends Friday, March 10. Plans of the sign-up for 1972 do not include an extension of time.

The 1972 Wheat and Feed Grain Programs offer many different options that a producer with a feed grain base or wheat allotment can elect after he elects to participate. In most cases farmers who grow corn in excess of their base may still participate. Also, farmers who wish to grow no corn but want to preserve their base can participate and still draw some payment. Payments this year will generally be larger than in 1971.

Every farmer in Nicholas County who has a feed grain base or wheat allotment should visit their County Office and inquire about the Feed Grain and Wheat Programs. The options are so varied that some farmers can find an option that suits his type of farming.
