High speed chase ends in Nicholas

The driver of a speeding car was arrested by State Trooper W. E. Bowles in Nicholas County early in the morning of Feb. 26, after a chase of speedies in excess of 100 miles per hour that started on the Paris-Millersburg Road.

Arrested on charges of speeding and carrying a concealed weapon was Jerry David Early, wife, 28, of Carlisle Route 3. Trooper Bowles said he was cruising toward Paris at about 2 a.m. Sunday, Feb. 26, having just come out of Millersburg and having crossed the bridge over Hixson Creek when he met two cars coming toward him at high speed.

The state trooper said he turned around and gave chase, and the two cars going through Millersburg at speeds of 70 to 80 miles per hour, continued on U.S. 68.

He said the lead car suddenly screamed off the highway at a Nicholas County side road, but the other car continued on down the road. Trooper Bowles finally stopped the vehicle at the intersection of U.S. 68 and Ky 36 in Nicholas County.
