## Ministers adopt calendar

The Nicholas County Ministerial Association met at the Carlisle Methodist Church on Wednesday evening, March 29. On Thursday evening March 30 the Candlelight Maundy Thursday Communion service will be held at 7:00 p.m. The Junior Choir will sing at this service.

Maundy Thursday services will be observed at the Shrine of Our Lady at 7:30 p.m. Commemoration of the Last Supper and Our Lord's institution of the Holy Eucharist will be observed. Highlight of the mass will be eucharistic readings from sacred scripture and partaking of the Body and Blood of Christ. Eucharistic adoration will follow the mass until 10 o'clock.

There will be Maundy services at the Carlisle Presbyterian Church also. The service will consist of a candlelight communion service at 7:30 p.m.

March 30, April 1 at First Christian Church, Dr. Loren Broadus will lead in a Church Renewal Service at 7:30 p.m. each evening. Good Friday service in Car-

lisle will begin with a Way of the Cross service at 12 o'clock noon at the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe. This service will consist in brief scripture readings and meditations on Christ's journey to Calvary.

The traditional Good Friday Community Service will be held at the Carlisle Baptist Church on Friday, March 31 from 2:00 to 3:00 p.m. The theme for the service will be "The Love That Will Not Let Go". The local ministers will participate in this service.

At 7:30 p.m. a Penance Service will be held at the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Included in the service will be the Sacrament of Penance. This will be followed by the traditional worship Service commemorating our Lord's Passion and Death. Highlight of this liturgy will be the reading of the Passion according to John and the solemn unrolling and adoration of the cross.

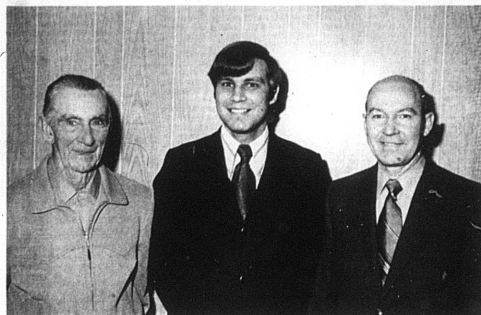
Holy Saturday services will be held at Our Lady of Guadalupe at 8:00 p.m. The solemn Easter Vigil liturgy will be celebrated with the blessing of the new fire and Christ Light ceremonies. Following this selection of scripture will be a reading relating the history of salvation from the time of creation, climaxed the salvation theme will be the blessing of the Baptismal Water, and the renewal of baptismal vows. The Vigil/Mass of Christ's Resurrection and Christian salvation conclude the Vigil services.

April 1 at 8:00 a.m. the Methodist youth will sponsor a Youth Prayer Breakfast at the Carlisle United Methodist Church.

The Community Easter Sunrise Service will be held April 2 at 6:30 a.m. at the Carlisle United Methodist Church. The speaker for the occasion will be a former alumnus of Carlisle High School, Dr. Albert Swearly, whose father was once pastor of the local Methodist church and who also was District Superintendent of this district. Dr. Swearly is now the District Superintendent of the Lexington District.

Plans by local congregations for Easter Services, as well as other April activities, will be published later.

The Ministerial Association finalized plans for counseling services at the Nicholas County High School. A local minister will be on campus on Wednesday from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m. each Wednesday. They will use the Guidance Counselors office for their counseling sessions. Any high school student may make use of these services.

## Burley transfer list posted

Burley tobacco growers in Nicholas County can find names of growers who want to transfer their quotas and those who want to acquire quotas listed in their county ASCS office.

A special bulletin board is posted, listing burley tobacco producers' names, addresses, and the amount of quota each producer wants to transfer to acquire, said Harvey Wagoner, Chairman of the Nicholas County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

"Listing farmers who want to participate in the Burley tobacco quotas transfer program is an attempt by the county ASCS office to give better service to farmers," Mr. Wagoner said.

As soon as an agreement is reached between producers, the farm owner or operator of each farm should come in to the county ASCS office to sign the official leasing agreement.

Any Burley tobacco grower who wants to offer his quota for transfer, or acquire additional quota,

should get the information to the county ASCS office as soon as possible so that the posted lists will remain accurate and up-to-date. There is no cost to producers for this service.

## Fiscal Court Doubles landfill charge to city

City Council was informed by letter Monday night that the Fiscal Court plans to raise the landfill rental from \$200 per month to \$400 per month.

The consensus of the councilmen was that this figure is too high. Several Councilmen agreed to attend the Fiscal Court meeting to discuss the increase. It was stated

that the City of Millersburg uses the County landfill for \$225 per month. The increase is effective Mar. 1.

The city's trash pickup charges will necessarily be increased because the city is losing money under the present trash charges income.

Serious consideration is being

given by Council to raising gas and water rates. City Clerk Robert Chanisor was instructed to present figures at the next meeting indicating what raises will be necessary to produce a reasonable profit on utilities sold by the City.

A group of residents from Sycamore Hill appeared at Council to protest the building of another housing project at the top of Sycamore Hill on property sold by Ray Fiera to Carter Ferguson of Lexington. Mayor Bill Power told the group that Ferguson had promised to place the housing project on five acres at the back of the land with no access road to Sycamore Hill and that these provisions would be included in any contract by the City to provide utilities to the project. The residents promised to pay the fee when they asked the City for permission to connect their line with the City sewer system.
