## Everybody got a raise . . . even the taxpayers!

FRANKFORT—Every elective and all appointive state officials have been given pay increases by the action of the General Assembly. The raises are school teachers, deputy circuit court clerks, magistrates and police officers of third class cities. In House Bill 111 every elective official was granted a salary increase and the governor's salary was increased to a maximum of \$27,500 a year, beginning with 5.5 percent increase July 1 and another 5.5 percent increase July 1, 1973. This fits the federal government wage scale.

## Uncle Sam grows bigger

The maximum salary that police officers of third class cities may draw was raised from \$6,000 to \$6,500, but the minimum salary of the third class can pay is \$7,500 instead of the present \$7,000.
