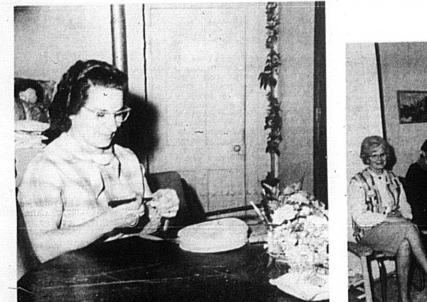


Dorseyville Center holds open house Friday

The Dorseyville Center has been in operation five years, opening its doors in November of 1966. Mrs. Harold McClanahan and Mrs. Reynolds Allison, Economic Developers, are in charge of the center which is open from 9 to 4:30 Monday thru Friday. Volunteer helpers, Mrs. Ernest Robinson, Mrs. Charles Toy, Mrs. Ermine Hill and Mrs. Leonard Fife are on call when needed.

The Center's emphasis is on crafts production. Materials of all kinds, including good quality thread, bedding, yarn, needles, etc., are donated to the Center by various manufacturing companies.

These materials are taken home or worked on at the Center by Nicholas County Women. They use their creative ability to turn out a useful and/or decorative product which they can sell on their own or bring back to the Center for display and sale, for which they receive the money. There are about 18 women working on products regularly at the Center.

Among the varied items on display are quilts, children's dresses, hooked rugs, pot holders, chair cushions, aprons, doll clothes, bonnets, pillows, and ornamental table arrangements.

The Center is also used as a classroom. Mrs. Allison has conducted classes on nutrition, canning, arts and crafts, home improvement, mail box improvement, and ideas on "creating a product from what you have at home."

Care boxes are equipped and stored at the Center for use by families when disaster strikes such as a fire. A box will contain canned goods, wash clothes, pillow slips and sometimes a quilt. Materials have been supplied to 4-H students, working on projects in school. Bibs and bod pads have been made for patients at Johnson-Matthews Nursing Home and Nicholas County Hospital.

The Dorseyville Center is also a social gathering place for young and old alike, and as Mrs. McClanahan says, "we are sometimes called," "rocking chair storytelling."

all-time high.

The current \$430 billion temporary ceiling has been in effect since last July 1, as has the \$400 billion "permanent" ceiling.

The gross Federal debt by June 30, 1973, says the new Federal budget, is estimated to be \$493 billion, up about \$84 billion since the end of F.Y. 1971. This increase is greater than the whole U.S. debt for F.Y. 1942.

Payments for just the interest on this debt in F.Y. 1973 are estimated at \$21.2 billion, or \$20 per household, says the Foundation for Economic Education. In 1963, when interest payments on the debt totaled \$1.2 per household.
