Democratic votes of 1968 into the county Democratic vote that same election and multiply by the base of 2,000.

"Add the two resulting figures and divide by two, thus giving the number of delegates from the individual county to the congressional district convention.

In Jefferson, Kenton, Fayette, Campbell, Davison and Hardin counties, the formula applies to legislative districts.

Purchase of burley stalks 'disturbing'

The purchase of some 4.2 million pounds of burley tobacco stalks by an Eastern paper company which has been making homogenized tobacco scrapers for several years is viewed by the Burley Tobacco Growers' Cooperative Association as a "development that is very disturbing."

The stalks have been bought by the Schweitzer Paper Company, a division of the Kimberly-Clark Corp., New York, under contract with some 200 Central Kentucky farmers.

The stalks have been taken to Lexington, as a central collecting point and will be shipped to the company's plant at Lee, Mass. Farmers are being paid five cents a pound, a \$100 a ton, for the stalks.

R.C. (Dick) Travis, vice president for export promotion for the

Burley Co-Op and a cigarette manufacturing expert himself, said the development on the use of stalks raises a serious threat to burley farmers in the further displacement of their leaf in manufactured tobacco products.

An agent for the company in Kentucky said the stalks would be used in an experiment to produce a high quality paper, but officials of the firm acknowledged that the stalks could find their way into a new process for homogenized tobacco, which in reality, does displace natural leaf tobacco.

Discussing the development, directors of the Burley Co-Op, headquartered in Lexington, said they were concerned that if the stalks were actually used in what could be classified as a tobacco product then they possibly could be subject, under the price support and control program, to the same quota conditions and penalties as

leaf. Few, if any, farmers would sell stalks for such manufacture if they were charged against quotas because they would be used in a tobacco product. Apparently, the development opens several new considerations concerned with whether all of the tobacco plant would be considered marketable tobacco.

Up to now, the scraps and stems used in the homogenizing process were remnants of marketed leaf tobacco, and this is the first time the stalks have been projected into possible tobacco product use.

Besides being used in the homogenized sheet-tobacco manufacture, the stalks also would be used in a patented process, to extract "essence," or authentic tobacco aroma to apply to any material, including synthetics, manufactured as a tobacco substitute.
