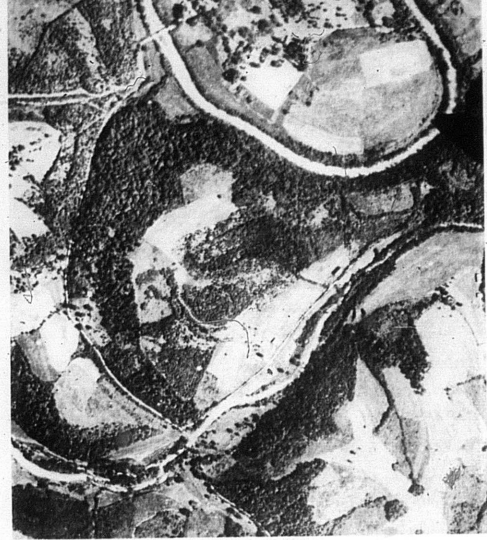

changes in the past three or four years, some of the new varieties which have been released may not produce your present one. The County Extension has varieties currently recommended for this area and can help you decide what varieties will best suit your farm.

At the University of Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station through its variety testing program measures crop performance data throughout the state. This information is used to select the best of corn hybrids, tobacco, soybeans, small grain and forage varieties. After careful evaluation and proven performance for a minimum of three years, the superior varieties are placed on the recommended variety list. Thus these varieties are now to be adapted to Kentucky conditions before they are recommended.

Many new varieties are released each year, making variety selection more and more difficult. Even though an advertisement or salesman claims high yields and increased disease and insect resistance for a new variety, it is wise to check with the extension office or the experiment station before planting your entire acreage to that variety. Most farmers are depending on a small acreage of a new variety the first year.

About April 1 is a good time to apply pre-emergence herbicide to your lawn to prevent crabgrass this summer. It must be put on before the seed germinates to be effective. The materials recommended are: benlate, benlate, benlate. Benlate may be listed on the container by their chemical name or brand name and may be confusing but the common name is usually listed.

Some beef producers may be interested in the first Central Kentucky Teated bybred April 6. About two thirds of the 92 bulls at test will be sold. These include 25 Angus, 12 Herefords, 15 Polled Herefords, 11 Charolais, two Santa Gertrudis, one Red Poll and one Black and White. Most of them are bred for meat quality. All producers are invited to attend the sale.

Thanks to modern agricultural techniques and machinery, combined with the science of planting and harvesting, United States' crop production per acre has soared by 50 percent since 1950. The total input of labor on the farm has dropped by 17 percent and the output per man-hour has increased 100 percent since the year 1900. Of the total farm output of the United States in the past 20 years, 68 percent was harvested. 12 percent was used as pasture, 10 percent as silage for summer fallow; and the remainder is held for soil improvement.

tucky in the administration of Federal laws and programs."

Representative Perkins is the dean of the Kentucky delegation in the United States Congress and was elected to the Chairmanship of the House Education and Labor Committee on Jan. 23, 1967.

Perkins was the author and sponsor of the Vocational Education Act of 1963, the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 among other major legislative enactments in the field of education.

Perkins was one of the authors of the Agricultural Extension Act and has been an ardent advocate of recreational and natural resources development in Kentucky.

As a result of his extensive efforts major recurring projects have been authorized and are underway including Flaptrap Reservoir, Barra Fork Reservoir and Red River Reservoir. Perkins is seeking the Acceleration Act and is currently constructing of these new lakes.

Perkins was the author of the black lung benefits provisions of the Coal Mine Health and Safety Act which provides disability payments to miners and their widows on account of the miner's disability or death attributable to the coal dust which he inhaled while working in a black lung area.

Born in Highland, Kent County, Oct. 15, 1914, Perkins is still a resident of his home town. He received his elementary, secondary and college education at local Kentucky schools. He served

Jury prepares

A Federal grand jury today returned a four-count indictment against a Louisville tax return preparer.

Indicted was Grant H. Bingham, Jr., 36, Lett Rd., Holiday Mobile Home Park, 8219 Millers Lane, Bingham was charged with preparing and assisting in the preparation of false and fraudulent 1970 Federal income tax returns. The indictment charged that Bingham operated collections on returns prepared for other persons.

If convicted on the charges, Bingham could receive a maximum sentence of 12 years in prison and a maximum fine of \$20,000.

Sentence agents, tax auditors and special agents of the Internal Revenue Service, Louisville, Ind., say Bingham was charged with charging the evidence leading to the charges was not only in the Carlisle, Ky. area but also in the Louisville area. Individuals whose returns are determined to be false are liable and depending upon their knowledge of the falsity may also be liable for civil and criminal penalties.

County savings bond sales

The citizens of Nicholas County bought \$11,053 of Series E and Series F Savings Bonds during February, sales for the two-month period totaled \$24,274. The County's annual goal is \$78,400. Sales a year ago were \$8,333.

Two terms as County Attorney, Mr. James L. Jackson, Jr., was elected to the first two months term of the Board of Commissioners. The Board of Commissioners met on March 28.

W. A. Dunca, president, said fuel costs have increased 75 percent since 1968 with further increases in the future expected and that bond interest rates are two or more times as high as only a few years ago.

"We conservatively estimate that within the next five years, now facilities for environmental control systems will cost the company at least \$77.5 million," he said.

The company is seeking approval from the Public Service Commission of Kentucky of an increase in its total service rates. The increase hearing on the request is scheduled for April 10.

Stockholders voted to double the board of directors from five to ten.

Nicholas County Quarry must apply for permit

Fifteen Kentucky industries must apply for a permit operated through the Kentucky Air Pollution Control Commission (KAPCC) by April 27 or shut down.

The KAPCC issued cease and desist orders to 14 stone quarries, one being the Nicholas County Quarry. And one asphalt plant usually located in the area.

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
