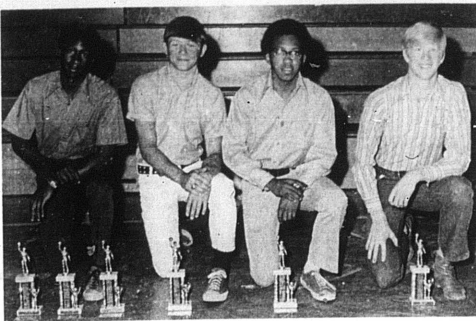


NCHS Baseball Team continues winning streak

The Jackets took a twin bill from Tollesboro Saturday by scores of 11 to 10 and 1 to 0. In the first game, Gerald Hutton homered with two men on, to tie the score in the fifth inning, and Billy Allison drove in the winning run in the sixth.

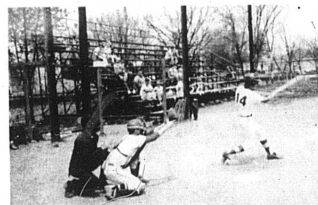
In the second game Roy Fryman pitched a one hitter and Darrell Snapp singled home Steve Mitchell for the only run needed.

Guards to hold local Bean Feast on Sat., May 27

Planning to repeat last year's success, the Kentucky National Guard will hold a summer camp for boys at its weekend training site near Greenville in July.

Also for the second consecutive year, the local Guard, in conjunction with other Guard units, will hold a "Bean Soup Feast" at the armory on Saturday, May 27, from 11 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., to raise funds for the camp.

About 20,000 bean soup fanciers attended the feast last year and raised some \$10,031, according to state Adj. Gen. Richard L. Frymire. The Guard hopes to raise \$18,000 this year.

The Kentucky Summer Youth Camp is for boys who might not otherwise be able to attend summer camp.

Its three one-week sessions are run entirely by volunteer guardsmen. The sessions are scheduled for July 5-11, 12-18 and 19-25.

"We plan to provide wholesome activities for the young men to participate in while integrating patriotic, traditional and purposeful views of the American way of life," General Frymire said.

Activities at this year's camp will include swimming, baseball, field trips, a football clinic with Western Kentucky University football coach Jimmy Felix and a basketball clinic with members of the Kentucky Colonels.

In addition there will be demonstrations of National Guard aircraft and other equipment. Frymire said bean soup feasts will be held at 39 different National Guard armories around the state during the month of May, most of them on or around Armed Forces Day, May 25.

Nursing seminar

Emergency Nursing will be the topic for a two-day seminar to be held May 11-12 in Louisville.

Nurses from emergency rooms, intensive care and coronary care units, operating and recovery rooms and from industries have been invited to attend this course.

Lecturers by several members of the faculty from the University of Louisville School of Medicine, and demonstrations of cardiopulmonary resuscitation, monitoring and inhalation therapy equipment will be two program features.

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Essay contest title told

"Trees - Their Effect on Me and My Local Environment" will be the subject of the 1972 Conservation Essay Contest which is sponsored by the Courier-Journal and the Louisville Times.

The annual competition, open to all Kentucky elementary and high school students, is probably the largest essay contest of its kind in the United States. Last year, there were 86,057 essays written on "Land Use" - its effect on My Local Environment.

In the contest, students are asked to write essays of no more than 1,000 words and the top award winners -- 121 district winners and three state winners -- receive \$3,825 in U. S. Savings Bonds from the two Louisville daily newspapers.

Subjects in the competition have included pollution, land use, forestry, soil and fish and wildlife conservation. This year's subject, trees, is new in that students will write about the effects trees -- whether in the back yard or in the forest -- have on them and their environment.

The contest is in its 29th year and over 1.2 million essays have been written by students on the various contest subjects since its inception.

Co-sponsors of the Conservation Essay Contest, along with the Courier-Journal and The Louisville Times, are the Kentucky Department of Education and the Kentucky Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Detailed information and contest reference materials will be sent to principals of all schools in Kentucky in mid-September.
