Congresswoman Edith Green of Oregon asked the Library of Congress to compile a list of all funds a family could receive if that family took advantage of all public assistance programs available on the basis of income. The list would include families—no matter how small—eligible for aid from the state or federal government. Green said that she was advised that the first family could collect a total of \$11,515 a year under various programs of financial aid ranging from health care to scholarships. The second family, if all available federal programs were utilized, could have an annual income of over \$21,000, she said. Green said she would like to see how many other people across the country who are saying this.
