Stevens named

Roy Stevens, a former assistant to the Kentucky commissioner of highways and more recently editor of the Kentucky Farm Bureau News, has been named executive assistant to state Personnel Commissioner Cate Low Miller. Miss Miller announced Stevens' appointment at a recent meeting of the State Personnel Board in Frankfort.

Stevens, 31, is a native of Princeton and a 1963 graduate of the University of Kentucky. He was employed by the Highway Department, Division of Information, on receiving a degree in journalism from the University of Kentucky, and in 1965 became administrative assistant to the commissioner of highways on the completion of his graduate work.

In January 1968, he was named assistant director of information and public relations for the Kentucky State Personnel Board.

With fresh fruits coming on the market a good light cake is nice served with a dish of fresh strawberries, rhubarb or any combination of fruits. It will even give a lift to a dish of canned fruit.

We have had our delicious rich frosted cakes but now you need one not too sweet. After all you want the cake to complement the fruit, not overpower it. This HOT WATER SPONGE CAKE is light, easy, inexpensive and good any time. It is also good for making "upside-down-cake". However, it is best served with fruit.

- HOT WATER SPONGE CAKE**
- 1 cup sifted cake flour
 - 1 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 - dash of salt
 - 2 eggs, separated
 - 4 cup sugar
 - 6 tablespoons hot water
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Beat egg yolks until clear and lemon-colored; gradually beat in sugar, then hot water, vanilla and finally flour, fold in quickly and thoroughly the stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into very lightly greased 8 inch square pan. Bake at 350 degrees about 35 minutes.
- Since fresh asparagus is on the market at this hearty sandwich, served with fruit and cake for dessert, will make a meal.

CHICKEN & ASPARAGUS SANDWICH

Make a sauce using 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup mayonnaise and 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese. Combine milk and mayonnaise and heat until just warm. Stir in cheese. This is the spread sauce for four sandwiches. You can increase ingredients to suit your needs.

Now on four pieces of toast arrange four or five spears of asparagus, cover with sauce and top with drained, sliced mushrooms and broil until lightly brown. Garnish with fresh parsley, wedges of peeled tomatoes cut in quarters or rings.

Eggs are cheaper right now and the addition of hard boiled or deviled eggs will make a hearty luncheon plate.

RHUBARB SHORTCAKE

It takes about one pound of fresh rhubarb to yield four servings. Remove leaf and stem end and wash. There is no need to peel the rhubarb unless the stalks are old, which is not likely right now. The peel turns pink when cooked. Cut in one inch cubes, add 1/4 cup water and 1/2 cup or more of sugar. Rhubarb is very tart so you may want to add more sugar. Cover and simmer about 15 minutes or until tender.

In individual serving dishes, put a portion of English Shortbread, cover with rhubarb and top with whipped cream.

Rhubarb is also good served with the HOT WATER SPONGE CAKE. Do not mix them, but serve separately.

PECAN UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE

1 recipe Hot Water Sponge Cake
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar

1 teaspoon water
1 cup pecans, part chopped and some whole ones
heavy cream, whipped

Preparation: Melt butter in frying pan. Add brown sugar and water. Stir until thoroughly mixed. Remove from heat. Arrange whole nuts flat side up in syrup and cover with cake batter. Bake in a 325 degree oven, about 50 minutes.

Loosen cake from sides and turn out immediately on cake plate. Allow pan to rest over cake a minute or two so that all syrup drains on cake. Serve with whipped cream.
