BENJAMIN W. MURRAY
Military gravestone services were held at 2 p.m. in the Carlisle Cemetery on Monday, May 1, 1972 for Machinist Benjamin W. Murray. The plane was shot down during World War II, and whose body was found 26 years later on South Pacific island.
Services were conducted by Chaplain of the Naval Reserve Training Center, Lexington.
Machinist Murray was a career Navy man and single when he died. He was a native of Carlisle, the son of the late Thomas and Elizabeth Alexander Murray of Carlisle. He attended the Carlisle City School and was a nephew of the late Ben Alexander of Carlisle and Mrs. Brown Buchanan of Lexington.
Survivors are two sisters, Mrs. Cecil M. Stewart, Georgetown; Mrs. Robert E. King, Lexington and a half sister, Mrs. David C. McMurry of Lexington, and several distant relatives in Carlisle and Nicholas County.
On July 23, 1944, a Navy transport plane carrying Murray and 16 other men was shot down by the enemy en route from Cairns, Australia, to the Admiralty Islands.
