Also wounded in the shooting were: Wallace's personal body guard; Alabama State Trooper, Capt. E. C. Doherty; Mrs. Dora Thompson, of Rogers Heights, Md., a campaign volunteer; and a Secret Service Agent, Nick Zarvan.

A young man was taken into custody shortly after the shooting identified as Arthur Bremer, 21 of Milwaukee, Wis.

Gov. Wallace is expected to recover, however there is some question about paralysis from the waist down.

D & B names James H. Burnaw Southwest Regional manager

James H. Burnaw, son of Nicholas County Clerk J. Berry Burnaw and Mrs. Burnaw has been named manager of the Southwest Region of the Business Information Division of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc.
