day. The figures are from the first report for Kentucky which presents detailed statistics on housing for each county.

The report shows that in the county there were 339 housing units with air conditioning (327 without units and 12 with a central system). 1,445 units with a clothes washing machine, 503 with a clothes dryer, and 106 with a dishwasher.

The 1970 population was 6,506, with an average of 3.9 persons per housing unit.

A total of 4,374 housing units were built before 1949, 927 during the 1950's, 599 during 1960-64, and 812 within the five years preceding the April 1970 census.

Utility gas was used to cook the meals in 322 households, electricity in another 1,221, and bottled, tank, or LP gas in yet another 324.

There were 1,760 housing units with complete kitchen facilities and 1,375 with complete bathrooms, both for the exclusive use of the households. The number of bedrooms in all housing units ranged

Proof of age can make social security claims easier

People who may soon be eligible for social security benefits can make the claim process easier by getting their birth certificates or other proofs of age in advance, according to Ray L. Colyer, Social Security District Manager in Lexington.

"Proof of age is a key factor in processing claims for social security benefits. Birth dates and relationships also must be established for dependents entitled to benefits.

"A birth of baptismal certificate received before your fifth birthday is usually adequate proof of your age," Mr. Colyer said.

"If a certificate was filed when you were born," he said, "social security can tell you how and where to write to apply for a copy."

Any social security office will help you develop proof of your age.
