\$90 million of farm products exported

Lexington, Ky.—More than \$90 million worth of Kentucky farm products went to overseas markets during the 1971 fiscal year, according to a University of Kentucky agricultural economist.

He said that the total value of exports for 1971 was \$90 million, or about 10 percent of the total cash receipts from the sale of farm products.

The value of exported Kentucky products was \$36.4 million. Export values for other farm products were soybeans, \$16.8 million; lard and tallow, \$6 million; protein meal, \$5.1 million; feed grains, \$5 million; and other products, \$12.2 million.

For the whole United States, Houtgast said about 15 percent of cash receipts from farm marketing come from foreign sales. U.S. agricultural exports reached \$7.7 billion in calendar 1971, a new high. The record was set in percentage above the \$7.3 billion calendar year record set in 1970.

The new gain raised the agricultural trade balance to \$1.3 billion from the \$1.5 billion the previous year.

Houtgast said the U.S. is the world's largest exporter of farm products. In 1971 it supplied the goods for one-third of international agricultural sales. The output of more than 200 different products in this country, or about 40 percent of total U.S. production.

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
