County tobacco festival is set for November 14

According to S.R. Barlow, publicity chairman for the Nicholas County Tobacco Festival, the festival planned for Nov. 14 will be one of the best ever. Several changes have been made in the program. The best crop and best handled crop will only need to have the four grades including Flings, Lugs, Bright Leaf and Red Leaf.

Premiums are \$10, \$8, \$6, \$5, \$4, \$3, \$2 or eight plants in each of the four classes. Each class is made up of three hands containing at least 20 leaves in each hand. The best crop will get \$10, and best handled crop will receive \$25. Both will receive a living crop but will not be eligible for any of the class prizes. Each grower that has a complete exhibit and does not win as much as \$5 in premiums, will receive a \$5 prize.

The Nicholas county growers including all club members and FFA members are urged to exhibit. Total prizes of \$50 will be presented to winners. Door prizes will also be donated by local business people and given to the lucky winners during the night program.

The festival is sponsored by interested tobacco growers, and by tobacco warehouses and local business people. Festival programs will be available in business places, ASCS Office, Extension Office or from any of the festival committee members.

Carlisle Jaycees get grant

The Carlisle chapter of the Jaycee organization has received a \$200 grant. The chapter was one of more than 160 local Jaycee organizations across the country which submitted grant applications to the U.S. Jaycee "Project 2000," a program designed to develop citizen participation in the awareness and resolution of community environmental problems.

About 150 grants were awarded. The grant to the Carlisle Jaycees was one of \$200 in Kentucky, with Louisville receiving \$400 to publish and distribute ecology court procedures.

In announcing the grant, Bernie Brand, CEO director, said: "In evaluating grant applications, the National Review Committee sought projects having a high potential for local impact on the issues and conditions of pollution. The grant also favored applications that 'most effectively multiplied the need money grants by mobilizing local public and private resources, as well as those projects that could be extended to other communities across the country.'"

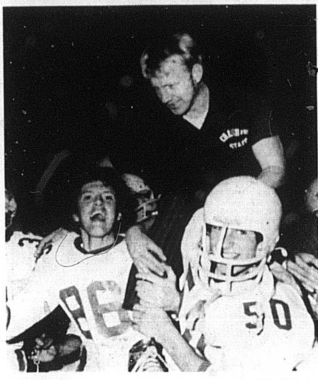

Jackets over Estill 34-22 Nicholas does no wrong

The Nicholas County Bluejackets closed out their 72 season in grand style Friday as they exploded for four second half touchdowns in a 34-22 swamping at the expense of the Estill County Engineers. Estill County led the Jackets in first half total offense 101 yards to 64, but Nicholas was the only team that got points on the board with Ken Livingston's one yard plunge late in the second quarter. John Soper added a different flare to the Bluejacket game as he split the uprights perfectly when he kicked for the extra point. Nicholas protected the lead and the half ended with the Jackets on the good side of a 10 score.

Nicholas provided the only scoring in the third and the lone T.D. was the result of a steady drive consisting of four major plays. The Jackets had attained possession on the Estill County 50 yard line and on second down picked up nine yards of Ken Simon's end sweep. Joe Wilson snaked for the first down and two plays later Kurt Kelly carried for 12 yards to the Estill 20 on an end-around which completely fooled the Engineer defense. Here the Jackets were stacked up and on fourth and 10 Joe Wilson rolled to the right looking to pass. His receivers were

Two break-ins at Carnico; three local stores hit

Two summer cottages in Section C were broken into sometime between Wednesday afternoon and Sunday. Both places were ransacked.

The log cottage belonging to W.B. Parker on lot C-212 was entered by cutting a hole in the front porch screen door, opening same then climbing through a window. The only thing reported missing was an electric torch, although an electric grille was found in the yard of lot C-212.

Thieves made off with considerable loot from the A-frame across the road on lot C-212, property of Warren H. Fisher. Taken were an electric trailing motor, fly rod and reel, spin casting rod and reel, castium reel electric torch and a black and white set. All drawers had been ransacked.

Entrance to the A-frame was gained by prying open a hinged porch window, removing the screen, opening the porch door, then breaking a wooden panel in a door leading into the cottage proper.

Sgt. Trooper Steve Boy, and Sam Fife investigated the incidents Sunday afternoon. Trooper Boy spent considerable time during for finger prints at both places.

Thieves hit three local stores. Three local businesses were entered Monday night and several items, including some small change, were taken.
