Jefferson Jackson Day Dinner in Frankfort last February. Miller told the assembled Democrats to look at Brown for the future.

Former Gov. Edward T. Breathitt also is being known that he could be interested in the party's nomination for 1974 and William Sullivan, one of Huddleston's co-chairmen in one of the campaigns and president of the Kentucky State Bar, could be interested. Sullivan was one of the co-sponsors of the \$200,000 race on which campaign money was borrowed for Huddleston in the last days of the campaign.

The analysts also are going to be looking at the 1973 gubernatorial race in which Lt. Gov. Julian Carrick now seems to have the advantage on the Democratic side. However, that contest still remains between Carroll, Miller and Gov. Wendell Ford, for Carrick ran with former Gov. Bert T. Combs against Ford in the last gubernatorial primary.

There is an outside chance that Brown could be persuaded to run against Carrick for the 1973 party nomination instead of the Senate nomination in 1974, but not likely.

Brown has the advantage of being unswayed in politics, well known as a successful business man, and nationally known for his fund raising help for the Democrats. The national race looks more favorable for him.

If Sullivan doesn't get the nod from the party bosses for the 1974 Senate race, he could be the one encouraged to run against Carroll in 1975.

In the Republican slush, for the 1975 gubernatorial race are Robert Collins, former parks commissioner whom Nunn defeated for the party nomination for the U.S. Senate this year, former Highway Commissioner Eugene Goss who worked in party headquarters for Nunn, and maybe James Hunt who ran for lieutenant governor in 1971.

Then, there's the outside chance Nunn could change his mind although he said law professor.

If Nunn wants any further government service, there is a strong possibility he may join Nixon's cabinet. Former John Sherman Cooper said last week he is confident Nunn would be offered the opportunity.

Trailer with built in heaters are easily vented outside, but portable gasoline and propane heaters tend to burn up oxygen, sometimes at a surprising rate. In your tent you had a certain amount of oxygen ventilation. In a solid-walled trailer you have little.

Catalytic heaters are excellent for eliminating the chill factor and keeping gear dry, especially in tents, which hold the dampness. They can be compared with charcoal briquettes used in the home. It can be fatal if CO runs in a sealed house, yet it's perfectly safe in a drafty tent. So the rule is: Open up before you light up.

Incidentally, I wouldn't leave a heater on all night, except in built-in, vented one.

Q—What can we do when tent pegs keep pulling out in loose soil?

A—Anyone who uses a tent, dining fly, screened in room or trailer awning, all of which require secure ground stakes, should make a set of 18 inch "beach" pegs. These tough metal stakes will hold, and hold, when camped on loose or sandy terrain.

Q—Sometimes an uneven ground refrigerator in my travel trailer doesn't cool properly. I always make sure my trailer is level. What you suggest I do now?

A—Next time you set up, level your trailer as you would a car. If it's not level, the refrigerator, not the trailer. This should eliminate what I suggest is your problem—peepers lines that aren't feeding properly, causing poor coolant and water flow. That, possible damage to your cooling elements.

Q—What do you look for in good hiking shoes?

A—The best hiking shoes made are manufactured in Italy, constructed of leather with a hard rubber sole and a porous insole. They are made in two styles. Veteran hikers wear two pairs of work—walking shoes. One for comfort.

The Psalms for Modern Man' available in large print

in the "Psalms for Modern Man" in Today's English Version, is now available in large-size print for the American Bible Society.

Published in direct response to numerous requests for a large-type edition of these ancient hymns and prayers, the new publication was inaugurated by the printing industry, an automated printing process.

Homes for the aged, nursing homes and hospitals throughout the country, welcomed "The Psalms for Modern Man" upon its publication in December, 1970.

and soon began asking the American Bible Society for the same volume in large-size print for their residents with failing eyesight could use it for inspiration and love.

"The Psalms for Modern Man," the first book of the Old Testament, to be published in Today's English Version, has achieved a circulation figure of three million copies.

"Tried and True" Job, has reached a circulation figure of two million since it was published in August, 1971. Latest Old Testament books published are Proverbs and Ecclesiastes, which were working steadily on the completion of the translation of the Old Testament.

LET'S TALK TURKEY

extra tenderless and flavorful, of course, you'll pay a bit more.

COOKING: Cook slowly, allowing about 20 minutes for each pound at 350 F. If it's under 15 pounds, at 325 F. It's a good idea to use a meat thermometer for the holidays or any day in the year.

TENDERNESS: The age of the bird determines how tender it is, so buy a young bird. The label may designate it as Young, Fryer-Router, Young Hen or Young Tom. Older turkeys, best tender, may be labeled Mature, Yearling or simply Old, and are suitable for stewing, baking or soups.

SIZE: Buy the biggest gobble you can afford. The bigger it is, the more meat it will have in proportion to bone. A turkey less than 12 pounds is close to half water. Half a 20-pound bird may be a better buy than a whole 10-pound bird.

DEFROSTING: The right way to defrost a turkey is slowly in the cooler it defrosts, the less weight it will lose while cooking and the juicier and tenderer it will be. Leave it in its wrapper in the refrigerator and expect it to take 24 hours, even more for a big bird. Never, but never, defrost a turkey in water, or you'll lose a lot of protein and vitamins down the drain.

BASTING: If you want to save yourself work, you can buy a pre-basted turkey that has oil, fat, herbs and phosphates already injected. For the
