Barn and tobacco burn November 8
A nine-foot tobacco barn and about 4,000 pounds of stripped tobacco and the equivalent of eight acres of unstripped tobacco were destroyed by fire Wednesday morning, Nov. 8.

Fire officials said the barn was owned by Walter Hoveman and located on the Hardy Pike in the northwestern section of Nicholas county. When flames responded to the call about 11 a.m. the barn was ablaze and beyond control.

Hoveman said he had been working in the barn shortly before 11 a.m. when he heard a roar blow outside the structure. He said he stepped outside the door and discovered the barn was on fire. He barely escaped before the structure collapsed.

The loss was partially covered by insurance. Faulty wiring was believed to have been the cause, firemen said. The second fire in the county about 9:30 p.m. the same day destroyed an outbuilding near the home of Sterling Jackson on Bald Hill Road, near Rose Hill Church.

Those submitting bids are: Hobart Crump of Millersburg, \$1200 per month; Carlos Watkins, \$1000 per month; Norman E. Watkins, \$1000 per month; John W. Rogers, \$1100 per month; Kenneth Khamel, \$1200 per month; and Junior Ishmail and Stanley Morris, \$1100 per month.

The Councilmen voted 5-1 to study the proposals for two weeks before making a decision. Richard Host voted "no" on the motion.

Council approved Mayor Bill Power's appointment of A.V. (Doc) Allison as a democratic member of the Housing Authority. Allison replaces the late George Carter.

Mike Jones was appointed to replace Gayle Vanlandingham who resigns to accept a position in Bowling Green. Jones will remain at his present salary until July, 1973. The vote was 5-1, Don Smith dissenting.

A committee was appointed to investigate the cost of exterminating the City Building. A "No Parking" sign will be erected 40 feet from Dorsay Avenue to Main Street.

Gerald Adams was hired as a full time patrolman on a six month basis, effective Nov. 15.

The City Christmas party is planned for Thursday, Dec. 14, at Garrett's Restaurant.

A Building Permit was granted to Tommy Vaughn to build a concrete building on Spruce Street. Jones was instructed to put some rock at the church on Mulberry Street. It has washed out.

The purchase of a \$125 double blue light for the new police cruiser was approved. Also, a meter machine will be rented for \$7.50 per month for a three-month trial basis. It will be used to stamp bills each month.

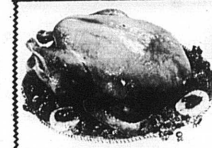
