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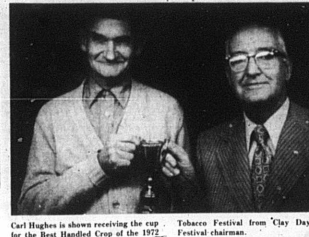

TOLLEBORO FIRST OF 23 GAMES

NCHS net season opens here Friday

Nicholas County High School Basketball team will open its 1972-73 season against Tolleboro here Friday night, Nov. 24.

Coach Bill Anderson has one of his largest squads as 38 boys came out for the Blue Jacket team. Experience is short, as there are only three seniors, Gerald Hutton, Kurt Kelley and John Soper, and three juniors, Victor Bromagen, Doug Fryman and Doug Jones, are returning lettermen. Coach Anderson noted that this would be the smallest team he has ever coached. All of the squad is 6 ft. or less and

added that "determination would have to make up the lack of height."

Sophomores that look promising are Raymond Compton, Doug Darbro, Wallace Edwards, David Fryman, Charlie Downs and Billy Darrell. Freshman that will probably dress with the varsity are Ricky Hicks, Mike Fryer and Gerald Thompson.

Coach Anderson has had his squad in practice for six weeks but Soper, Kelley and Compton started two weeks ago after the football season.

Nicholas County will play a 23 game schedule plus a Christmas week tournament at Augusta.

County road aid for coming year

FRANKFORT Governor Wendell H. Ford and Highway Commissioner Charles Fryer, Jr., have announced the 1973-74 County Road Aid Program for Nicholas County. It is based on the allotment of \$63,175.00 for the coming fiscal year.

The program provides maintenance for 141.2 miles of county roads. The mileage listed includes 128.5 miles of blacktop and 12.5 miles of traffic bound surface.

The maintenance activities authorized will be accomplished by the Kentucky Department of Highways and the Nicholas County Road Department.

The County Road Aid Program began in 1936 when the General Assembly selected this means of helping the

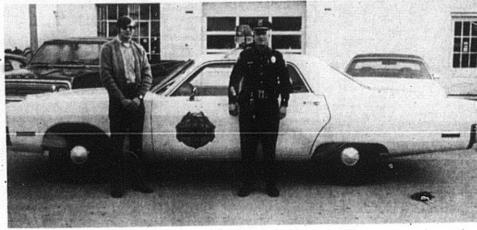
Junior Clubs over the state are working with this project endorsed by the Kentucky and National Societies for the Prevention of Blindness.

Dr. Daugherty to display rock collection

Dr. Joe Daugherty, Lexington Oral Surgeon and associate Professor of Oral Surgery at the University of Ky. Medical Center, will display his collection of a "stone cold meal" to the Carlisle Rotary Club members and their wives Thursday, Nov. 30, at the Masonic Lodge Hall, 6-30.

Featuring such delicate dishes as ham steak, broiled lamb chops, T bone steak and old Ky. ham, the menu offers a special child's plate and a weight watchers special.

Dr. Daugherty states that all of his dishes are made of pure rock and notes that all the rocks are "nature's own colors." The only modification to nature's creations is minor polishing and cutting.

He has received first prizes for his exhibit from the Cincinnati Mineral Society, the Indiana Mineral Society,

and the Ky. Dental Association.

The collection was completed after three years of searching and probing for the perfect "ingredients." Dr. Daugherty says he found 90% to 94% of the rocks himself. A picture may be found on page 31.
