HOME FIRE FIGHTERS

Every fire year break out to 500,000 American homes. The chances are it won't happen to you—but if it does you should be ready and able to keep a small blaze from becoming a big blaze. One or more portable fire extinguishers can be your first line of defense against disaster.

When you shop for an extinguisher, look first for the Underwriter's Laboratory label or the Factory Mutual Standard. If you don't see the label, don't buy it. The Underwriters' Laboratories divide house fires into four categories:

- A—Ordinary combustibles (wood, paper, cloth)
- B—Gasoline, gas, oil, flammable liquids
- C—Electrical appliances or defective wiring
- D—Involving combustible metals

Note the charming simplicity in this pattern, which blends with the classicism of doubleknits. The detachable collar and how add an extra measure of practicality, as well as a fresh note of fashion.

Preparation for sewing knit fabric is just as important as it is for sewing wools. There is the possibility that it may be made of polyester. Wash the fabric in the same way you would wash wool fabric. Machine basting may be used on a firm knit such as doubleknit. Use extra long stitches, which may be easily removed by clipping a stitch every few inches on the top side, then pulling the underknit thread.

Though you have made pattern alterations, it is still necessary for you to fit the garment before permanent stitching. This is particularly important when it is your first time to sew knit fabric. Machine basting may be used on a firm knit such as doubleknit. Use extra long stitches, which may be easily removed by clipping a stitch every few inches on the top side, then pulling the underknit thread.

Just as with woven fabric, select machine needle and thread size according to the weight of your fabric and thread size according to the weight of your fabric. Use ballpoint needles and pins for knits, as they push the threads aside instead of puncturing them. Be sure the needles are sharp, and change it from time to time if necessary to prevent snags and pulls.

DOUBLEKNIT HAS DUAL PERSONALITY

It's no wonder doubleknit fabric continues as a wardrobe basic. A doubleknit, which is made with two sets of needles to form a two-knit appearance, has comfort in its stretchability. At the same time, it has body and firmness. Yet, it will drape attractively, without being too stretchy.

Polyester has led the doubleknit party for the last few years, outstripping wool because of its washability. However, it's not so easy money, as well as time spent patterning to the dryer's convenience and economy—outbalance frequently dull polyester colors and boring patterns, as well as a certain harshness.

New textile manufacturers are offering doubleknits in blends of polyester and acrylic, and of polyester and wool. These wool blends produce superior coloration, and variety in patterns.

Both acrylic and wool take color beautifully. Filling and snags are reduced. There is an improved softness in texture.

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
