Daniel Boone '72 season ends

The Legend of Daniel Boone, Outdoor Drama located in Historic Harrodsburg, Kentucky, closed out its '72 season playing to a larger audience than ever. The outdoor drama was especially high this past season. Our 8,000 visitors from 43 states and 9 countries enjoyed Kentucky's re-enactment of its birth and frontier days.
Approximately 10,000 Kentuckians attended the "Legend", with all but 12 of our 120 counties represented.
A net gain of over \$1,700.00 was claimed during the 1972 production. All this was accomplished with 8 less performers than were scheduled. There were 56 scheduled performers this past season; 36 were completed. Threatening weather lowered attendance figures throughout the season but "The Legend of Daniel Boone" staff continued to work with getting all the performances in.
With a comfortable '72 season behind, "The Legend of Daniel Boone" looks toward 1973 with assurance of greater success. As always, an improved production, a professional cast, and good family entertainment are in the making for next season.

The American Party's Sixth District Campaign Committee announces that Tom Anderson, party's candidate for Vice President of the United States, will be the guest of honor at a fundraising banquet to be held at Lexington's Springs Hotel, 4 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 13.
