FORD BOTHWELL
If newspaper work is Fred Botwell's profession, camping is his avocation. He has years of experience in both fields.

Now 41 years of age, he has been camping since age 9, first on a free-lance basis in the backyards, later as a Boy Scout, and later as a Marine. But the bulk of his camping has been done with his family of six and family groups, comprise 90 percent of today's camps.

Botwell has camped in tents, lean-tos and camping trailers, traveling by car, canoe and rubber raft, from Nova Scotia to the Far West. He travels with a tent, sometimes a camping trailer and a typewriter. His columns are often written on location, and the deadlines are where the camps are.

His newspaperman for 21 years, he has won numerous awards, including three top statewide awards in one year from the Louisville News-Paper Publishers Association.

Advertisers, also, are aware that camping is a multi-billion-dollar market. Some often request placement on the same page with Botwell's column. They figure that he's reaching the campers, and so will they.

Botwell's lightly written column covers the full spectrum of the outdoors—camping, hiking, fishing, hiking, canoeing, wilderness camping, backpacking, etc.

Kimberling was a passenger in the Pock vehicle when it crashed at the intersection of the Blvd. and West 14th Street. According to Rome police Sgt. Doug Williams and patrolman J. W. Solomon and Wayne Ashley who reported the accident, stated Pock swerved his car in an attempt to avoid striking a car turning into West 14th Street. Kimberling was thrown from the overturned vehicle.

City Council votes on gas hookups; advertises for trash pickup bids

City Council approved a new gas policy Monday night at its regular meeting. A letter will be sent to Columbia Gas stating that no more gas hook-ups will be allowed by the City unless they were promised before Sept. 1. All current gas customers will be asked by the City to conserve on gas usage as much as possible.

The City will advertise for bids on trash pick-up. The contract will become effective May 1, 1973. The present contract is held by Kenneth and Junko Ibsen.

Blueprints of the proposed Green Valley Apartments were discussed by Council. A letter will be written to McConley and Tume Architects, Lexington, suggesting some changes be made to coincide with those agreements originally made by the owner and the City. The road through the project will not be permitted to open onto Sharon Way. Separate water meters must be installed at each of the 48 units, rather than using the meter above on the plans. The City will provide sewer services provided the project plan meets these requirements. The letter will also suggest that the three lower units be moved farther back from City dwellings on Sycamore Hill. These three points were originally agreed to between the owner and the City.

Voters register

The state closed its voter registration books Tuesday, and Nicholas County Clerk, J. Henry Burdette announced at the close of the day 128 Democrats, 32 Republicans, and 4 Independents had registered. Of these figures, 23 Democrats and 7 Republicans registered for the first time, 41 absentee ballot requests.
