## Nicholas County's first derby winner is dead

Buellton, Calif.—Determine, the little gray colt that Californian Bill Ritchie, who was bought as a yearling because of his size, won the 1954 Kentucky Derby, was put down late in September at Dr. James H. Buell's Rancho Jonata near here.

Determine, who was one of the incurable problem in his urinary tract. A son of Alibhai out of the Starred Koubala, a daughter of Mahomed. He was bred by Dr. E. L. Ashbury, who offered Ritchie a profit on the colt, after Crevelin had expressed his disenchantment. However, Crevelin reconsidered and Determine went on to win 15 races and \$573,300 in his colors. In addition to the Churchill classic he also captured the Santa Anita Derby and the Santa Anita Maturity (now the Strub).

A durable campaigner, Determine started 41 times over three seasons. He was trained by the late George W. Kent.

The Nicholas County Freshmen football team captured their second and third victories this last week. The M.M.I. team was defeated 24-0 with Gerald Thompson scoring first on a 46 yard jaunt with Clifford Thompson adding the extra point. Joe McCarty added two points on a safety when he tackled an M.M.I. back in the end zone. Gerald Thompson added two more touchdowns from one and two yards out, Duane Williams recovered a fumble in the end zone for an extra point to complete the scoring. A 33 yard pass play from Joe Ruddlel to Damon Booth traveled to the 10 yard line and set up one of the bluejackets

scores. The same Ruddlel to boom duo had a 42 yard T.D. pass nullified by a safety. Jeff Howe, Ricky Mattox, and Jerry Snapp stood out differently but certainly not out-hustled at the guard spot, and Harold Massey was a bright spot at his end position.

Coach Huey Cornelius gratified the team for their steady performance and continued improvement. He emphasized the necessity for all 11 boys to do their job on every play before we can reach our potential.

The third win for Nicholas county was gained at the expense of Garrard county by a 36-0 score, Saturday, Oct. 14.

Gerald Thompson opened the scoring with a 24 yard run with Duane Williams adding the extra point. Clifford Thompson ran for six points from the five yard line but the extra point attempt failed giving the freshmen a 14-0 first quarter lead. Ronnie Potts passed to Damon Booth for a 42 yard score and Duane Williams again added the extra point.

The Garrard County team scored on a short plunge following several bluejacket penalties. Bill Clark scored from two yards out followed by an extra point attempt. Duane Williams closed out the scoring when he failed to find a receiver on a pass play and very alertly avoided the "side-scape". The lesson was taught by 42 yards and a T.D. Joe Ruddlel and Harold Massey were the key blocks on the play. Gerald Thompson added the extra point. Jimmy Smith gave a good performance from his center position.

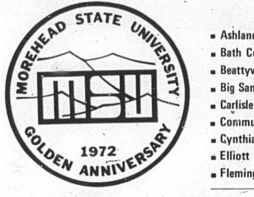

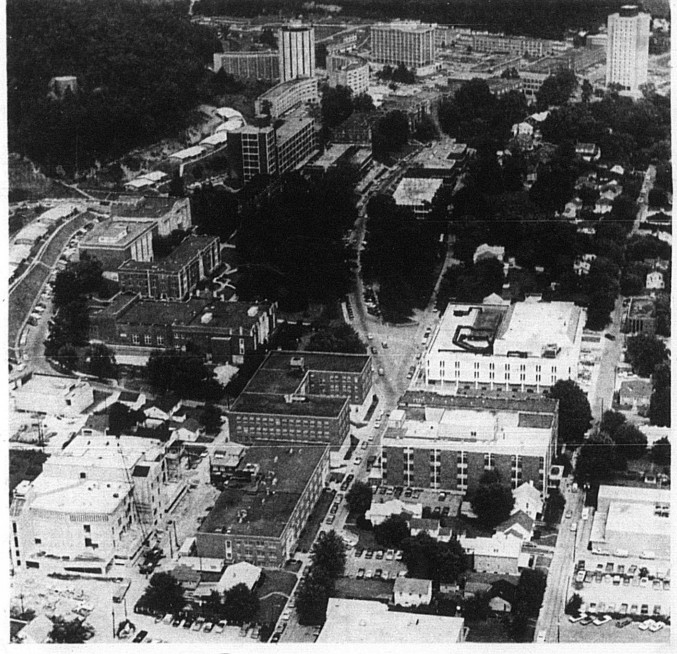
