

# My trip to Spain September 7 is a red letter day for me!

Thursday, September 7, 1972 is a red letter day for me. The day I embarked on a "once in a lifetime" trip to Spain to visit my brother and his wife, Cy and Betty Johnson, and three sons, Matt, Mark, S. and David eight months. Cy and his family are stationed on the Roca Naval Base, Vota, about 65 miles south of Sevilla, on the Bay of Cadiz.

I departed from the Greater Cincinnati Airport, charged with anticipation and a stomach full of butterflies. The first stop was New York's La Guardia Airport (coming in I spotted Yankee Stadium and the Empire State Building), and a mad dash to the front of the terminal to catch my flight to Kennedy Airport. The sight that greeted me was a maze of taxi cabs and buses, each trying to pass to other, their horns blaring, and drivers bawling out their windows at each other. Madison Street, Carlisle, was never like that. Finally a bus stopped, and a 20 minute "musical" ride brought us to the Pan Am building at Kennedy. After standing in one of six lines for a seat selection, I was ushered through a weapons detecting station, and my bag and flight bag were thoroughly checked. Upon boarding the flight to Atlanta, hoping (praying is more like it) to arrive in London, England in 1985, I was told, "Sorry, it's quite a feeling to see dawn breaking on the horizon with your watch reading 12:00 a.m. We were all asleep and didn't get up to set our watches up six hours."

I was disappointed. My flight didn't disappoint me. Foggy it was and cold. The airport is very modern. There was most charming gentlemen waiting to direct the 350 distinctive passengers to the different airline counters. Did you

ever ride on a horizontal escalator? It operates on the floor down the middle of a long corridor leading to one of the main waiting lounges. Two boys and their brother have walked past as I was browsing along, and by the time I had had my coffee and had had camera loaded, the escalator had carried me out of the building on the Bay of Cadiz.

Just listening to the British talk is a treat. They are so formal and exacting in their speech. Makes you wonder where we Americans went astray. A British European Airways Flight Number 180 carried me across the English Channel, western France, Northern Spain which is very mountainous, and landing in Madrid. It was a relief to learn the language barrier doesn't exist at major international airports, as most all ticket agents speak English. While waiting for the flight to Sevilla, it was my pleasure to meet a very charming British lady, Mrs. Jane Oliver, who is a regular feature writer for a leading magazine in England, Harper's Bazaar and The Queen. Her articles concern property and travel. She co-authored the book, "The Man We Lost, the Abduction and Life of the Duke of Windsor." She made the flight to Sevilla seem all too abrupt.

Here I was in Spain, land of grape vineyards, olive groves, matadores and Flamenca dancers and three weeks in which to enjoy it! The view of the Bay of Cadiz from Cy's backyard is beautiful with the blue Atlantic stretching to the horizon and the coastline of Cadiz to the left and the U.S.S. Holland, the submarine tender, anchored to the right. If you've never seen a bull-

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## Dr. Randall speaks China subject of talk at Woman's Club

"We of the Western world do not know how to communicate with China as we know for 14 years," said Dr. Robert Randall of Eastern Kentucky University's department of History and Secondary and Higher Education who spoke Monday night, Oct. 9, on "The People's Republic of China" in the Carlisle Junior Woman's Club. Dr. Randall described the situation as he knew it for 14 years since 1941 when he and his family were forced out during World War II. Dr. Randall's father was a Baptist missionary.

He said he thought it was great to see how the Chinese will view the world as the center of the universe. He said the Chinese man took over China. It was Dr. Randall's belief that the Chinese accepted God rather than starvation as the basic reason Communism was successful in China. Dr. Randall said Communism brought about cooperation among the people, provided good food, completely changed the attitude toward work by making it dignified for all other things he cited were the instilling an attitude of cooperative thinking, cleaning streets and cities, and doing away with begging and the begging of opium.

Dr. Randall commented on President Nixon's visit to China.

## Kay's Kitchen

Have you thought of what you might do with all those pumpkins after the Goblins have come and gone? Do you move it from place to place and just have to throw it away, or the children won't want you to put it in the trash can? Here are some ideas that will help you make something special out of it.

Have you thought of making Pumpkin Pickle? Here is the recipe. It came to me when I first started writing this column and I put it away to use at an appropriate time. And how well it worked. Each year at this time I would start looking. This year I started the search earlier and at last here it is! I have and it made the pickle myself. It is a good cook.

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you can clean and cook a fresh pumpkin to make 2 cups. However 1 pumpkin should provide you with 4 cups of pumpkin seeds to me.

PUMPKIN COOKIES  
2 cups sugar  
2 cups shortening  
1-1/2 pound can pumpkin  
2 eggs  
2 teaspoons vanilla  
4 cups flour  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons ground cinnamon  
1 teaspoon ground allspice  
2 cups raisins  
1 cup chopped nuts

In mixer bowl, thoroughly cream together sugar and shortening. Add pumpkin, eggs and vanilla; beat well. Sift remaining flour, baking powder, salt and spices. Add to cream mixture and mix in raisins and nuts. Drop dough from rounded teaspoon into greased cookie sheet about 2 inches apart. Bake in 350 degree oven for 15 minutes. Remove from baking sheet to cool. These are good as they come from the oven, but you may frost with your favorite icing.

Here is a good banana nut bread and it makes two loaves. If your family likes banana bread, this is especially good because one loaf is gone before you know it.

BANANA NUT BREAD  
1 cup margarine  
2 cups sugar  
4 eggs  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons soda  
1 cup flour  
1 large banana, very ripe, small  
1 cup finely chopped pecans  
Cream together margarine and sugar. Add egg, one at a time, beating well after each one and mix dry ingredients together and

Softly gelatin in cold water. Combine pumpkin, 1/4 cup sugar, egg yolk and milk; cook boiling water 5 minutes, stirring constantly; add soft gelatin and stir until slightly thickened. Turn gradually into remaining 1/4 cup sugar into stiffly beaten egg whites. Fold into mixture. Put in to baked or prepared crust and top with shredded nuts. Chill until firm.
