Beef carcass data service available

The Department of Agriculture's Division of Markets is offering carcass data service, providing there is sufficient interest among producers.

If implemented in Kentucky, it will be another cooperative program between the state Agriculture Department and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The program has been operating on pilot basis in some Midwestern states and has proven successful there.

The program operates in this manner: A farmer buys specially designed ear tags at 50 cents each from the Division of Markets. When animals with ear tags are slaughtered, a meat inspector will remove the tag from ear and attach it to the carcass.

A USDA meat grader is then notified to evaluate quality and yield grade factors of the tagged carcasses. After this data is recorded, it is sent to the Agricultural Marketing Service's Carcass Data Center in Washington. There it will be processed and returned to the respective states, which in turn will get it out to the producers.

**Jackets fall short, Berea wins 22 - 14**

Nicholas County turned in what could possibly be called their best performance of the season against the Berea Pirates, the same team that handled the Jackets easily last year.

The Bluejackets never were out of the contest, which saw some exciting Nicholas County backfield show in a long time—a constant offensive threat. The Jacket offensive machine rolled up 185 total yards, picking up six first downs as compared to Berea's 10.

The key here was the running of sophomore Raymond Compton, who has been used sparingly as a running back this season. The Jacket line showed up, was literally line showed up

very well and the mere presence of Ken Livingston was an important factor. Although the Berea defense was not set up specifically to center around Livingston, it was obvious that Berea respected him and this of course took a lot of the pressure off Compton, who in the offensive backfield.

The game opened with Berea showing the Nicholas County fans what a fine football team they are. It took the Pirates exactly five plays to march from their own 40 to paydirt and Berea jumped on top to stay, 6-0. Darrell Miracle carried off-tackle for the F.A.T., and Berea had an early 8-0 advantage.

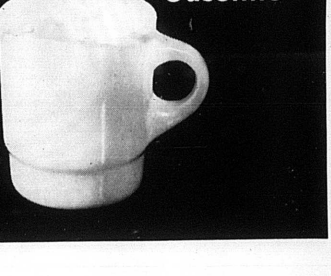
