CHOLERA OUTBREAK EMPHASIZES IMPORTANCE OF HEALTH PROGRAM

The current outbreak of hog cholera in Kentucky has very much emphasized the importance of livestock health regulations and a strong livestock sanitation program.

While the investigation has not been completed, there are strong indications that the outbreak is the result of infected hogs being "bootlegged" or moved in violation from a stockyard back to a farm, but all those involved complied with health regulations. It is very unlikely that the outbreak would have occurred.

Once the outbreak had occurred, more extensive losses were prevented through the Federal-State livestock health program. The State Department of Agriculture's two modern diagnostic laboratories enabled rapid diagnosis to be made—a factor that permitted health officials to begin control measures much sooner than would have been possible if it had been necessary to send test samples out of state.

It is unfortunate that it sometimes takes a disease outbreak to make the public—and even farmers, appreciate the need and significance of health programs. Too, I think the current situation shows why more people than just farmers have a stake in Kentucky health programs. The ban on the movement of swine in Kentucky for example, not only affected farmers, but truckers, packers and to a certain extent, the consumer.

The program to stop and eradicate the cholera outbreak is a cooperative program between the Kentucky Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. We have enjoyed tremendous cooperation from other State agencies, particularly the

Do Sara's fellow employees resent her?

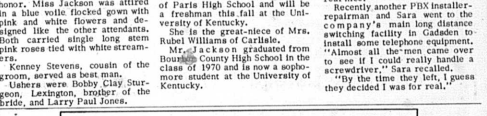
"If they do, they certainly haven't said so. Everybody's been real nice."
