

AGREE or NOT

FRANKFORT—The no-win job in every governor's administration is the handling of patronage. It takes a special breed of man for this job. First he has to be firm, fair and tough enough to be able to do what he is trying to convince someone the administration wants to help all it can within the bounds of reason. He also needs the guts to be excruciating and not let being called an SOB to his back hurt his feelings or affect his decision in the handling of patronage.

Neither is the job so tough? In the first place, there never are enough jobs to satisfy all the job-seekers who supported, or claim they supported, the administration in the last election. Furthermore, there never has been and never will be enough money to build all the projects needed to be built or wanted to be done areas during any four-year period.

Neither is it fiscally possible to finance all the projects sought and wanted by county delegations. Too many county campaign chairman make too many promises during the heat of the campaign. It has been over twenty times this time under laid down rules. Wendell Ford when he called all county contact men in Frankfort Dec. 18, 1969, he told them the state employs 7000 men who are not involved during his administration and warned them "If any man is offered, you're going to have face charges."

His Innovation Gov. Ford made moving the patronage office out of the Capitol and placing it in Democrat Headquarters in downtown Frankfort. Ford believes it is a party job and not the job of the governor and so does J. E. Miller, state Democrat Chairman. Many of the differences of opinion among some observers. Gray says letters that 95 percent of the county contact men are happy with the way patronage is being handled, although they don't always get what they want. "They understand," Gray said. Gray also believes that the cost burden of patronage should be on the party and not on the taxpayer. "I'm not saying," Gray said, "that at some future time the patronage should not be moved back to the governor's office. But he did maintain it should be handled at party headquarters during the beginning of a governor's administration." Gray didn't feel that he was unduly pressured by some of the logical men in campaign headquarters to handle it," he said, "for I know all or most of the cam-

Miss Joann Clinkenbeard weds Mr. David Alan Coy September 3

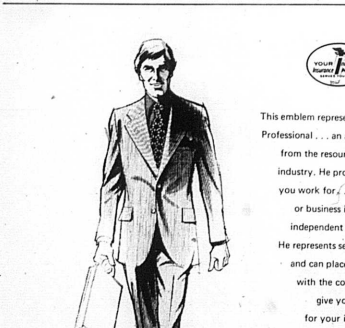
