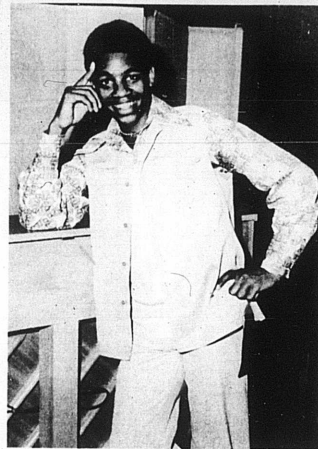
DePauw is a private, co-educational, liberal arts college of approximately 3,000 students. It has a College of Liberal Arts, a School of Music, and a School of Nursing.

effectiveness of production controls and, again, bring sharp criticism.
Berry and Baidler noted the results of a recent inspection for determination of the status of tobacco offered as the Maryland type in Lexington.
Of 11,724 pounds put up for inspection as Maryland leaf, subject to the typing decision of the graders, 76.3 per cent, or 8,956 pounds, was determined to be within the burley-Type 31 classification.
Considerable seed for 1973 Maryland output has been distributed in Kentucky, Virginia and Tennessee. Farmers run a risk in producing Maryland leaf, however, since it must be submitted for determination of type classification by U.S. tobacco graders or it will be presumed to be burley and, if sold, charged against burley allotments subject to penalty.
