Sunday's Sunrise Service speaker is Carl Flock

Carl H. Flock will be the speaker at the Sunrise Service on Easter Sunday at the Presbyterian Church at 9:30 a. m. Mr. Flock is associate general minister of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Kentucky, being called to the position in September, 1969 after serving as director of youth work and an associate minister with the Region since June, 1969. Some present areas of responsibility are: program coordinator, coordinator of District concerns and organization;

business manager, office personnel supervisor, secretary-treasurer, supervisor of publications and public relations, general consultant to congregations, staff consultant to the Council and the following: Regional committees: Budget and Funds, Assembly Program, and Consultation on Church Unions.

A native of Corydon, Ind., Mr. Flock is a graduate of Lynchburg College and the Lexington Theological Seminary. He has served pastorates in the Old Union Christian Church in Fayette County and the Crestwood Christian Church in Oldham County. He is married and has one teenage daughter.

He has held offices in the Christian Educators' Fellowship and the Kentucky Section of the American Camping Association. For three years he has served on the faculty of the Southern Academy of Teaching.

Sen. Huddleston to speak Saturday at fish fry at Blue Licks State Park

U.S. Senator Walter "Doc" Huddleston will speak at a Fund Raising Fish Fry, Saturday, April 21 at Blue Licks State Park beginning at 4:30 and until 7:30 p. m. The Fish Fry is being sponsored by Democrats from Nicholas, Fleming, Bath and Holberton Counties. Huddleston, the first Democratic Senator from Kentucky in 16 years, is a

member of the Senate Agriculture and Government Operations Committees. He is chairman of the Subcommittee on Agricultural Production, Marketing and Stabilization of Prices. He also serves on agricultural sub-committees dealing with the environmental rural electrification and foreign agricultural policy. On the Government Operations Committee, Huddleston serves on the Budget Management Sub-Committee and the Special Investigation Sub-Committee.



Two attend environmental Teen Leader workshop

The Teen Leader Environmental Workshop was held at Lake Cumberland 441 Center in Wayne County near Jaber, April 9-11.

About 150 young people, mostly sophomores and juniors in high school and members of 4-H or other youth groups attended. Representing Nicholas County were Mary Cohen and Len Grimes.

The purpose of the workshop was to create an awareness of the kinds and abundance of Kentucky's natural resources and teach their relationship between management, use practices and the effect upon our environment. Each student will do some follow-up work in his or her home county on environment and resource conservation, using the training received at the workshop.

During the week, the delegates studied different aspects of Kentucky's natural resources related to people, wildlife, forestry, soil, and water. Experts in these fields spoke at the workshop sessions and served as resource persons for group discussions.

In addition to these resource sessions, the delegates also had a chance to see demonstrations on forest fire control and on fish pond and game management and to take a resource and environment tour of the nearby area. They also viewed films each night on environmental and conservation topics. The University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service, in conjunction with the Federal Cautridge

Corporation, the state Committee for Youth Programs in Natural Resource Education, and Local Conservation Districts' Boards of Supervisors, sponsored this annual event.

Prohibited grazing period begins

Engine Letcher, Chairman, Nicholas County ASC Committee, reminds all farmers signed in the Feed Grain and Wheat Programs having set-aside acreage, that these acres cannot be grazed after April 1. This rule applies to those farmers who want to earn full program payments. No grazing can take place until after Aug. 31. No crop or pasture may be harvested from these acres at any time during the year. Farmers can still request to buy or

set-aside acres must be equal in productivity to the balance of the farm and normal maintenance of these acres is expected. Additional information can be obtained at the local ASCS Office.

If a farmer has already requested to take hay or graze the set-aside acres and he no longer wishes to do this, he may request that his payment be restored. This would apply when no hay has been harvested and no grazing has occurred. This request must be filed before Aug. 31. Farmers are also reminded that

set-aside acres must be equal in productivity to the balance of the farm and normal maintenance of these acres is expected. Additional information can be obtained at the local ASCS Office.
