**Virginia pine sawfly defoliation expected**  
The Virginia pine sawfly—a defoliating insect which attacks Virginia, shortleaf and pitch pines during the spring—has caused moderate-to-severe damage in eastern and southern Kentucky during the last five years.  
This insect does its damage during the larvae (immature) stage. The larvae are usually light green, with four gray-to-black stripes running the length of their bodies. Their heads are shiny black.  
According to surveys made during the winter of 1972 by the State Department for Natural Resources and Environment, Protection's Division of Forestry, Insect and Disease Section, defoliation by the Virginia pine sawfly is expected to be light this spring.  
The sawfly larvae will entirely complete their

### New regulations adopted for Mobile Home parks

New regulations of the State Board of Health has adopted under the Mobile and Recreational Vehicle Park Act of 1972 were developed to improve safety and sanitation in both new and old parks.  
John White, sanitarian at the Nicholas County Health Department, says he has copies of the new regulations and permit application forms available. "We have applied the new regulations and permit application forms to the Nicholas County Health Department," White says. "And if you need more advice and assistance, you can contact the Environmental Sanitation Program at the State Department of Health in Frankfort."  
The Act itself, passed by the 1972 General Assembly, requires park owners to obtain a permit to operate from the State Department of Health in Frankfort. It also requires anyone planning construction or enlargement of such a park to submit plans and obtain a permit to build before construction begins. An application and the required \$25 fee that helps cover the cost of process and review must accompany the plans. After the plans have been approved and the construction permit issued, the park

must be built according to the approved plans. Then a permit to operate can be granted.  
The new regulations for mobile home parks, which become effective January 12, 1973, specify what a mobile home park must be like before a permit is issued. Some of the changes apply only to new parks. White says. For example, a new requirement that each mobile home lot shall contain: "a minimum of 4,000 square feet applies just to new parks or reclosures requiring that all mobile home lots be identified by number and that the numbers be displayed in some systematic order will apply to both new and old parks."  
Other changes to improve safety and sanitation at the parks include specifications for adequate lighting, wider streets in new parks and a requirement that homes in new parks be placed on adequate foundation stands. A new regulation specifies that connections between the meter box and mobile home must be suspended or buried in a noncombustible way.

### Rabies problem remains serious in Kentucky

Kentucky is experiencing a serious outbreak of rabies and farmers and other animal raisers should be alert to the threat that this poses.  
During the first week of April, the Department of Health reported 17 positive cases, with these being found in 12 of the state's 120 different counties. Of this number, four were cows, which is of particular concern to farmers.  
The majority of cases, of course, are found in wild animals. In fact, it is this wild animal rabies that is the most serious concern of the department. Since wild animals are coming out in winter in southeast of an underbrushed condition, making them more susceptible to disease, as they search for food, they naturally travel over wider areas.  
People are cautioned to be alert for wild animals that act more friendly than normal, or which show signs of not being afraid of humans. Farmers are urged to be alert to odd or unusual behavior in domestic animals.

### Senator Huddleston seeks mechanism for budget control

WASHINGTON—Senator Walter Dee Huddleston has urged the Congress to adopt a permanent mechanism for determining and imposing a ceiling on federal spending.  
"The American taxpayers—and those who control the money markets throughout the world—are looking for evidence that the Congress is responsible and realistic in terms of the amount that it can afford to appropriate in the upcoming year," the Kentucky senator said.  
Huddleston said he will be concentrating his efforts on the new Senate Subcommittee on Budget Management toward the enactment of a permanent mechanism for controlling the budget.  
"To accomplish this will require modification of existing procedures through the creation of new mechanisms to assist Congress in budget development and preparation," he said.  
"We are currently reviewing 10 bills on the subject in the subcommittee, and I am hopeful that before long we can have a permanent procedure to follow. Without a permanent mechanism, we will be forced to act in a haphazard, year-by-year basis which will not be in order to an often chaotic budgeting system."
