Vietnam monument resolution passed by voice Senate vote

WASHINGTON—The United States Senate has passed by voice vote the Vietnam Monument Resolution, sponsored by Senator Walter Dee Huddleston (D-Ky.), which provides for the erection of a monument in the nation's capital honoring those Americans who served in the Vietnam War.

"This legislation is not designed to honor or glorify war," Senator Huddleston said. "But it is designed to pay tribute to thousands of brave young men who were called on to fight a long, unpopular, and little understood war."

The Kentucky senator pointed out that in the past two years 6,500 Americans have been killed in hostile action in Vietnam, and another 10,303 in non-hostile action. The number of wounded totals 302,649.

"These are not mere statistics," he said. "Each one represents an American life that has either been taken from us, or has suffered grievous physical injury. That is why we must memorialize and pay tribute to these men who fought in the Vietnam War. We must let them and their families know that regardless of how each of us felt about the war, we honor the men who served for their bravery and their sacrifice."

"It is also my hope that this monument will serve to heal some of the divisions that arose in this country as a result of the war. As with our P.O.W.'s, there is no disagreement among us about honoring the men who answered the call to fight this war. We can all agree that they served their country well, that they sacrificed for their country, and that they are worthy of our honor."

Two plead guilty to amended charge

Jimmy Morris and Cornelius (Buddy) Watkins, both of Nicholas County, entered a plea of guilty in Bourbon Circuit Court on an amended charge of attempting to commit a felony of grand larceny and each drew six months jail sentences.

The two were originally indicted on charges of stealing books from Andrew Frisach on the Jackstown Road.

The six months sentences were suspended for one year by Circuit Judge Robert Hall Smith on the condition that the two make full restitution to the complaining party.

The house from which the items were taken was unoccupied, Deputy Harney said.

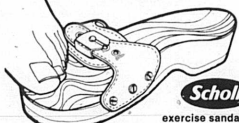
