### DEADLINE NEARS

#### Local Chamber seeks second win in ALL-Kentucky City contest

The Carlisle-Nicholas County Chamber of Commerce is making huge strides toward obtaining an All-Kentucky City title for the second time. Carlisle was last named an All-Kentucky City in 1970. The original 14-member steering committee has been reorganized into 7 chairmen for each of the 7 categories to be entered in book form. These chairmen are responsible for gathering the remainder of the information; for writing the category, and for typing that particular section. Chairman and categories are: David Zachary—Community Development; Jimmie Hall—Industrial Development; Mrs. Jimmy Conrad—Education; Mrs. Joseph H. Coole—Recreational and Cultural; Mrs. Charles Judge—Health and Welfare; Dr. Andrew Hamon—Ecological-Improvements; and Estil Nofsinger—Natural Resources. A deadline of the middle of September has been set by Hall and Hamon, over-all chairman, for the completion of the book. At that time another committee will be organized to prepare the all-important 15 minute slide presentation. Nofsinger and Zachary are already in the process of taking slides. Russell Bell will commentate the slide presentation. The deadline for the entire entry is set for Oct. 1 by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce. Carlisle is scheduled to appear at the district competition on Wednesday, Oct. 24, at a Holiday Inn in Lexington. If four categories obtain excellent, then Carlisle will be eligible to go to the state judging. Hall stressed at Monday night's meeting of the committee that anyone who has not yet turned over any portion of the entry to the chairman, to please do so as soon as possible so that the book can be completed by the deadline.

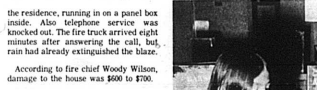
### Junior Woman's club announces reading program contest winners

### Dudley returns from taking course

Andy C. Dudley, president of the First National Bank, Carlisle, was among 1,648 student-bankers from 36 states and several foreign nations who have just completed the annual two-week residence session of the 26th annual Graduate School of Banking at the University of Wisconsin in Madison Aug. 5-17.

The school, sponsored by the Central States Conference consisting of the banker's associations of 16 midwestern states, requires attendance for two weeks each year for three years for graduation. A total of 480 seniors received their diplomas at the school's 1973 graduation exercises Friday night, Aug. 17. The Graduate School of Banking enables its students at the University of Wisconsin as educational services for all citizens. Attendance at the 1973 Graduate School of Banking enabled its students at Wisconsin's University not only to meet a large number of bankers from all over the country, but they also had the opportunity of hearing the school's distinguished lecturers, over 100 experts from all parts of the nation, who are recognized authorities in banking, economics, government, law and industrial and agricultural and financial problems.

### Dog clinic

The Nicholas County Health Department has announced that it will conduct a one day dog clinic for the vaccination of dogs for the dread disease of rabies. The Rabies Control Law, which requires all dogs over six months of age to be vaccinated against rabies, makes an owner liable for any person bitten by an unvaccinated dog, if the dog is rabid.

Due to the serious rabies outbreak in Kentucky this year and the fact that an outbreak could occur in our own area at any time, it is strongly emphasized by the health department, that every dog owner have his dog or dogs vaccinated. Even though the reservoir of rabies lies in our wildlife the most effective barrier between the wildlife in the woods and the Kentucky resident is the immunization of household pets. The fact that unvaccinated dogs are still the greatest source of danger because they are "members of the household" and constant companions of man, makes dogs 100 per cent preventable if immunized.

The clinic will be held Saturday, Aug. 25, starting at 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Nicholas County Health Center. Dr. James Noll will be the attending veterinarian. The usual charge of \$1.50 for a three year vaccination will be in effect.

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
