## ASC head reminds farmers to maintain land

Nicholas county farmers who have certified compliance with the 1973 farm program requirements are reminded to continue to carry out their commitment for the remainder of the year.

Esquire Letcher, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) County Committee, says that 257 farmers in the county had certified compliance with this year's farm program by the July 15 deadline. Certification amounts to a pledge by the farmer as to his program acreage, his acreage set aside from production, if any, and that he has complied with all program provisions, Mr. Letcher said.

He further pointed out that following certification, certain farms are picked at random for a spot check of program acreages. The accuracy with comparing actual acreages with those certified by the producer, spot checks have already begun and will continue throughout the remainder of the year. If a producer does not understand the rules for set-aside acreage, he should contact the county ASCS Office immediately.

## Outdoor Lore

Of all the wild fruit that grows in the United States, probably no variety is more highly prized by both man and middle than the ubiquitous blackberry. It is one of the first plants to appear and assume dominion over a field left uncultivated and, once established, is difficult to extirpate.

Over 100 species of wildlife, from moose to marmot and from wild turkey to wren, delight in its goodness. Besides its great value to wild creatures as a food source, its thorny branches, often growing in impenetrable thickets, provide comparative safety for birds and small animals to nest and rear their young. As Ovid observed long ago in his *Metamorphosis*, "The hare under the blackberry closely lying, spies and is safe from the hostile mouth of dog."

In times past, early settlers marked the last cold snap of spring, "blackberry winter," by its flowering. By the same token, Indians marked the arrival of midsummer by its ripening. And in addition to eating its fruit, both white man and red man employed its leaves and roots as medicine and its juice as a dye. Many a settler's wife wore clothing dyed a dark purple with blackberries and many an Indian warrior went into battle with his weapons and his skins stained with their juice. It may be said too that many a pioneer festive event was made more lively by the fermented juice of this wonderful product of the wild.

A very prickly member of the rose family of plants, the blackberry is a fruit family of plants. Many an erstwhile farm boy, notwithstanding the fact that the berries were often harder to handle than a turpentine tuncat and sometimes painfully scratched his nose and legs, gathered its bare feet, remembers with pleasure his July saunters into the berry field.

There amid the singing of yellow-breasted chats and wood thrushes was a frenzied world of outdoor adventure. He often flushed out young rabbits and ground hogs, exciting baby skunks and quail as he gingerly moved through the thickets with bucket on arm.

Sometimes, in teaching for a pod of berries high above on the tall canes, he would grasp instead the head of a blacksnake lying in ambush for some unwary bird. Sometimes he would amaze chiggers and wood ticks, but these minor disfigurements were of little consequence when measured up against delicious jellies, jams, and wonderful tangy cobbler pies that resulted from his labor.

It was here also in the blackberry patches that he learned a valuable lesson that sustained and stood him in good stead in later years when that berry vine of his youth were just a hazy memory. That lesson, straight from McGuffey's
