Food stamp amendments

ATLANTA, Ga.—The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced amendments to food stamp program regulations which:

—allow food coupons to be used to purchase imported foods and seeds and plants for home gardens, and

—require a nationwide food stamp program by June 30, 1974.

The revised regulations implement amendments to the Food Stamp Act contained in Public Law 93-66—the Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973—which President Nixon signed Friday, Aug. 10. They are scheduled for publication in the Federal Register on Tuesday, Aug. 21, and will become effective upon publication.

Future notices will detail other changes in the Food Stamp Program required by the new law.

The revised rules announced today redefine eligible foods as any food or food product—domestic or imported—for human consumption. The new food stamps to be used for the purchase of seeds and plants used in a home garden to produce food for the eligible household. Alcoholic beverages and tobacco are specifically excluded. The amendments also require states to implement the food stamp program in every one of their political subdivisions no later than June 30, 1974. No jurisdiction is exempt from this requirement, unless the state can demonstrate that it is impossible or unexpedient to implement the program in a particular area.

State Department calls for bids

FRANKFORT—The State Highway Department recently called for bids to be received by 2:30 for construction of 211 miles of the Paris by-pass road in Bourbon county.

The project, in two sections, calls for work on 60 mile of U.S. 27 and U.S. 60 from 206 feet northeast of Houston Creek bridge to Hillcrest Drive, and another stretch of 152 miles from near south limits of Paris north to U.S. 27 and U.S. 60 near the western limits of Paris.

BGADD evaluation session scheduled

Estill County Judge B.L. Brandenburg, chairman of the Bluegrass Area Development District Board, has announced that the Board and the State Office for Local Government will be cosponsoring the first evaluation session for the BGADD. The session will begin at 1:00 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 6, at the Springs Motel in Lexington. The evaluation will be presided by an Executive Committee member at 3:00 p.m.

Chairman Brandenburg stated that the evaluation meeting is open to the public and encouraged citizens interested in the activities of the BGADD attend and to comment on the District's purposes and activities on the evaluation panel. He expects the session to conclude by 9:00 p.m.

BGADD's evaluation is one of a series of such sessions being conducted in each of Kentucky's Area Development Districts this year. These first sessions are exploratory discussions between the ADG and the panels of State, Federal, and local officials who are invited to participate by the Office of Local Government.

According to Bob Benner, chairman of the Evaluation Panel, the Office for Local Government regards the session as an opportunity to explore the extent to which ADG is capable of undertaking expanded programs of technical assistance to local governments and providing regional planning services relevant to regional needs. In addition, the session acquaints key state officials with the range of services available through the District.

Practically all that many of the BGADD's activities affect each citizen of the Bluegrass area. Mr. Benner urged citizen participation in the meeting.

Frankfort-Lexington 1-64 opens today

Governor Wendell H. Ford will be on hand to dedicate the section 1-64 between Frankfort and Lexington on Aug. 20 (today).

Dedication ceremonies will begin at the interchange of 1-64 and US 60 at 11:00 a.m. The Governor will then lead a motorcade over the new section to a ceremony at the interchange of 1-64 with 1-73 near Lexington.

Headlining the activities along with the Governor will be Transportation Secretary Elijah M. Huger, Highway Commissioner James E. Gray, Federal Highway Administration representatives, and local officials from Franklin, Woodford, Scott, and Fayette counties.

The newly completed section of 1-64 will officially be opened to traffic after the dedication ceremonies at 2:00 p.m. eastern daylight time. The total length of 1-64 from Frankfort to Lexington is 17.3 miles. The total cost of this section is \$17,802,000.
