### Rev. Herman Kamlage elevated to Pastor

The Most Reverend Richard H. Ackerman, Bishop of Covington, has announced that Rev. Herman B. Kamlage has been elevated to Pastor of the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe.

In a letter to Father Kamlage, the Bishop stated, "In view of the fine leadership you have given as Administrator of the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe, it is with pleasure that I inform you that your canonical status has been changed from 'Administrator' to Pastor." Though Father will assume new duties, the appointment is of a more permanent nature.

Since coming to Carlisle on May 31, 1968, Father Kamlage has been active in the community. He is a member of the Nicholas County Ministerial Association and the Carlisle-Nicholas County Housing Commission. He is present secretary of the Hospital Board.

Father was born in Covington, Ky., of German immigrant parents, attended Villa Madonna College, Covington; St. Paul Seminary, St. Paul, Minn., and was ordained to the priesthood on June 1, 1951. He has held various associate pastorates, but does graduate study at the University of Cincinnati and Northwestern University, and has taught at Villa Madonna College.

### Burley prices soar

Unprecedented prices continued their spectacular rise on Burley tobacco auction floors in the United States when the Federal-State Market News Service reports grade averages made up of \$1 to \$2 per hundred over previous sales. Select grades of better leaf were selling 79 to 88¢. Quality improved slightly as offerings consisted of a larger percentage of good leaf, with less low grades. Volume continued heavy.

During week sales grossed 11,529,028 pounds for a record weekly average of \$2.34. This was 28.24 over last year's first week when 143,666,453 pounds averaged \$79.70 per hundred.
