OIL AND THE MIDDLE EAST

The prospect of a severe fuel shortage caused by Arab oil boycott undoubtedly will result in an agonizing reappraisal of America's policy towards the Middle East. Continued shortages of imported oil that region's cause not only inconvenience but personal hardship for millions, including a substantial part of the American population. Some observers believe the oil shortage could bring on a major recession.

The situation is even more threatening for America's allies in Europe and Asia. Japan obtains more than 90 per cent of her oil from the Persian Gulf area; the United Kingdom 66 per cent; Italy 84 per cent; West Germany 82 per cent; Australia 90 per cent. If these countries don't get adequate supplies of oil, their industrial machines will be forced to halt. For Japan, the shock of dependence must be especially severe. After all, it was an earlier denial of oil that led to Japan's decision to enter World War II.

In one sense, the Arab boycott may prove helpful to the United States. It is teaching the U.S. government and people that excessive dependence on overseas energy sources is intolerable.

In another sense, the Arab boycott may promote coal gasification, to better utilize the trillion tons of coal America possesses, to step up natural gas production, and to accelerate construction of nuclear power plants. In time, the United States will be free of dependence on imported oil. But what about the interim period of seven to 10 years?

Clearly, the United States will need Middle East oil during the interim. But to get the oil flowing again, the United States will have to take a diplomatic accommodation with the oil producing countries, chiefly Saudi Arabia. What the Saudis insist upon is U.S. support for requiring the Israelis to withdraw from the Arab territories occupied in the 1967 war and the recent conflict.

Up to this point, the United States has not responded affirmatively to the Saudi demand. But the American government and people will have to determine where the U.S. national interest lies. If this winter is very cold and if the shortages are critical, with resulting layoffs, hardships and closing of schools and colleges, both the government and the people are likely to make a rapid reappraisal of the requirements of the situation. It seems unlikely that the American people will be willing to undergo protracted suffering or a severe recession in order to support the Israelis' contention that its security requires continued occupation of conquered Arab territories. Indications that a major reappraisal of policy is in the works comes from numerous sources.

The power balance in the Middle East is very complicated and delicate. And the United States certainly will endeavor to refrain from actions that will cause the Arabs to believe they have a mandate for aggression. Yet there is the hard fact that the Arabs have the oil that the U.S., Europe and Japan must have if their cities aren't to be plunged into darkness and depression is not to spread because of a lack of essential fuel.

It is unfortunate that the Western countries allowed themselves to become so dependent on Middle East oil. But it should be remembered that in the United States, for example, there has been a massive surge of environmental protest against development of domestic fuels. For

LVPA guest speakers paint gloomy picture

Guest speakers at a dinner meeting of the Licking Valley Protective Association held at Cynthia's Gallery, Nov. 24, painted a dark shadow picture as the prospect for those who will lose their homes and property to this proposed project. The picture was painted for the taxpayers who must assume the tax burden of the former taxpayers, who will be forced to vacate to accommodate largely recreation.

In the light of predicted world conditions, would some persons presume that in left Kentucky is blessed with water and recreational facilities already established.

The silence of the Corps of Engineers at this time relative to this project, indicates their final decision to over ride all personal and human rights that they have the power to overlook.

One gentleman, a school instructor stated their School System could scarcely be kept going because of the excess vandalism that had occurred since their project was commenced. Their churches were not all under water, but the residents who maintained them down the valley. Consequently, these churches would not be repaired, and they would rather hear the church bells than the noise they were hearing.

Six counties are involved in this Flood project, and The Licking Valley Protective Association guests each first Friday night in the month, all interested parties are invited to attend and hear the results that may be expected as a result of this project. The Corps of Engineers stated when they were attempting to justify the Cave Run Dam that "The Cave Run Dam would substantially reduce flooding all down the valley." Consequently, these counties should not anticipate any excess flooding hereafter.

Leo M. Eisel, Ph.D. Chairman of EDPA's Water Resources Program states, "Dams alone won't stop floods..." and that with all the expenditures that have been made, that flood damage in the United States continues to increase. That such structures encourage development of flood plains and thus increase the potential for catastrophic flood damage with loss of life. We have already been warned that the elevation between the Falmouth site and Covington, Newport and Cincinnati is such that inestimable amount and loss of life could be expected, should the dam be ruptured at any time.
