Demo's chairman a flying senator

Everyone knows that the new chairman of the Kentucky Democratic Party has his feet firmly on the ground when it comes to government and legislative matters, but not everyone is aware of just how often the new party leader and President Pro Tem of the Senate Senate has his feet in the clouds. Sen. William L. Sullivan, of Henderson, is what some folks term a "high flying leader." When he's not in Frankfort or back home practicing law, the politician is likely to be soaring in the clouds in one of his three aircraft. Actually, flying is both a hobby and a means of travel for the Harrodsburg native. It's a definite advantage to be able to have breakfast at home in Henderson, climb into his single-engine Bonanza and be in Frankfort in 21 minutes.

It's an even greater advantage now that his duties have tripled with chairmanship of the Democratic Party and a rapidly approaching legislative session.

"Sully" (as he is known to his friends) explains that it all started when he went into the Army Air Corps during World War II.

"I served in the European Theatre as a fighter pilot flying P-47's. Since then I have maintained an enthusiastic interest in aviation of any sort. In 1960 I bought a two-seat open cockpit plane for \$200.00 and flew it through Mexico with a friend." Sully explains.

For the past six years, the youthful Senator has been an active professional race pilot.

"These planes are very small and very fast and we build them ourselves," Sullivan said. "Air racing is like an Indianapolis Speedway race moved fifty feet up in the air and increasing the speed half again."

Naturally, Chairman Sullivan is a racing award winner. He modestly admits to being among the top ten in the nation for the past ten years.

The serious, conscientious legislator is indeed a busy man. In fact, showing his accomplishments in the political and legal worlds, it's hard to believe that he has any time left for such exciting hobbies as flying and his favorite big game bow hunting.

He is a graduate of Centre College and the University of Kentucky College of Law and is a partner in the Henderson firm of Dersery, Sullivan and King.

His political career began in the State Senate in 1954. He served as Senate Majority Leader in the 1966 General

Assembly. Sullivan served as Commissioner of Aeronautics in 1968-69 and as Commonwealth Attorney in 1969-70. A former Outstanding Young Man of Kentucky, he was re-elected to the Senate without opposition in 1968 and has served as President Pro Tem since 1968. He secured his third term just this spring, with no opposition in the May primary.

As President Pro Tem of the Senate he inherits the reins of state government when both the Governor and the Lt. Governor are out of the state.

He jokingly admits that he probably has served more time as "appointed" Governor than any other man in the state's history, having "filled in" over thirty times since 1968.

This politician with a myriad of interests does have a family and they share those interests. His wife is the former Elizabeth Dorsey of Henderson.

Fraudulent employment advertising warning

I would like to caution you against accepting advertising promoting "job opportunities" in Alaska, on that states proposed pipeline construction. Workingmen in some states are going to Alaska on the promise of high-paying pipeline jobs which are at times non-existent.

Fraudulent advertising, offering high paying pipeline employment positions are creating a problem for Alaskan authorities. The advertisements appearing request that a registration fee be sent to a P.O. Box number. These advertisers are neither licensed nor bonded to do business as private employment agencies in Alaska and generally charge a fee in excess of the maximum allowed by that state's laws.

I would appreciate you contacting me immediately if you receive any such advertising.

I am also asking the news media to warn the public against fraudulent advertising of this type. I am informed by Alaskan authorities that:

1. Pipeline construction workers are not being recruited at this time.

2. Alaska is highly unionized. Hiring for this project will be primarily through the unions, supplemented by the State-operated Employment Centers.

3. Newcomers will find high prices, high unemployment and little room on welfare rolls.

4. Alaska residents will be given employment preference on the pipeline and other related construction projects, and, because Alaska has traditionally suffered the highest unemployment rate in the Nation, Alaska's Labor Commissioner feels that their labor force is more than adequate to meet any manpower needs that may be generated by the project.

5. Licensed private employment agencies in Alaska may not charge more than \$1.00 in registration fees, nor sell job information for more than \$5.00.
