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Kay's Kitchen

If this column seems a bit personal this week, I'd like to say I'm a bit tired to think of a change from the traditional black eyed peas and smoked jowl, my usual week back to the New Year's dinner served in my family. We observed the traditional custom of everyone else took down Christmas decorations and got the house back to normal. The rest of the food was checked, Tippy Cake made, and decision made on how many could be served with the food on hand which determined the number of guests we would be having for New Year's dinner.

The main dish naturally was turkey hash, though it was NEVER called that. It was "Turkey Supreme" and served from an English silver revolving tureen. As one of our guests once said, when the top was rolled back she always expected a white dove or something beautifully fantastic to fly out! The hash was served on either squares of cornbread or hot biscuits. Usually hot buttered peas were served as the vegetable. The salad was a combination of left-over molded salads—two of this, three of that—cranberry relish, etc. There was always a relish dish made up of left-over green and ripe olives, a variety of pickles and a few carrots and celery sticks. You would be surprised at how they will fresh and crisp up when put in a bowl of ice water in the refrigerator on New Year's morning, or the night before. The dessert was always "Tippy Cake," either made from the pound cake or pecan cake served at Christmas—sometimes one of each.



With most of the work done the day before, those who wanted to watch or listen to a football game did so, others usually wrote their Christmas "thank-you" notes.

The dinner was always a gala affair with many quips and jokes about how long New Year's resolutions would last, etc. When it was all over we used to say how nice to see the back of the refrigerator or a similar remark.

The only recipe you may want would be the Turkey Supreme and Tippy Cake.

TURKEY SUPREME: First remove every bit of meat from the carcass and cut into bite size pieces, if possible, leave the rest in shivers. Set aside. In a kettle put the broken carcass and cover with water. Add bay leaf, two or three ribs of celery, salt, pepper, coriander, one carrot cut in strips, and pinch of thyme. Bring to a boil and simmer several hours. Strain. The amount of broth you use will depend on how much turkey you have left. To the broth, add a bouillon cube, left-over gravy, Worcestershire sauce, turkey, canned or fresh mushrooms, one large pimiento slice, and thicken with cornstarch. When well refrigerated overnight until ready to heat for dinner.

TIPPY CAKE: Be sure to make the day before. Slice cake—either pound cake, pecan cake or fruit cake. On each slice drizzle about a tablespoon of whisky, sherry or brandy. The amount depends on size of slice and taste. Cover with whipped cream. Continue until cake is completely covered with whipped cream. Refrigerate overnight. To serve, slice down through the cake so there will be a layer of cake, layer of cream—and so on.
