and then decrease this amount by \$5,000 a month for the next six months.
When Gov. Louie B. Nunn took office, Spindtop was in debt and all of its property was mortgaged as well as its furniture and equipment.

He got a group of strong businessmen together and raised \$200,000 from a private source to pay the debt and then guaranteed Spindtop \$50,000 a year in state research projects. A strong effort was made to get Spindtop operating in the black and not dependent upon state contracts. For the first time in its history, in 1971 Spindtop had reduced its ratio of contracts with Kentucky to a low of 10 per cent of its business.

Spindtop was formed in 1961 under Gov. Bert T. Combs' administration with Lt. Gov. Wilson Wyatt as its guiding light.

The idea behind creating Spindtop Research was that it would be a great help to the Department of Commerce in providing information for its industrial development program to bring new industry to the state.

Spindtop has done some valuable work in this field, but it never has been able to draw enough clients from the private sector to pay a large share of its operating expenses. The state has had to carry the load.

One complaint some departments of state government have is that they are obligated to let Spindtop handle their research projects. No department can go to independent research organizations or ask others for a bid. The state is keeping in advance to keep Spindtop alive.

The payroll staff is the biggest financial load on Spindtop. Just can't seem to attract enough business volume to meet it, much less show an operating profit.

Gov. Ford also proposed to set up a State Planning Committee at an approximate cost of \$100,000 a month, to deal with Spindtop and give guidance on research projects for the state.

On this long-time observer of state government, it seems every time a problem arises we get a new committee organization that wastes jobs and costs money.

In a recent study made of Spindtop by a committee named by Ford, the committee found Management and Behavioral Science to do a study. This firm recommends that Spindtop gear down its full-time staff, make arrangements to sublet some studies, or hire consultants on a per diem basis.

What the report seems to be saying is that Spindtop should have much a large staff and try to be expert in every branch of state research projects and confine its staff to few specific fields.

The economists of Kentucky should be its chief field, it would seem, in support of the Department of Commerce in industrial development. It should be a collector of specific information valuable to state government.

The report also recommends that Spindtop draw upon the state university for experts in certain fields and let them prepare some of the research work.

The ever-expanding financial troubles of Spindtop has led one way on press here at the Capital to refer to the research organization as "spindtop."

Sen. Huddleston assigned to committees on Agriculture and Government Operations

U.S. Senator Walter "Dee" Huddleston (R-Ky.) first in the U.S. Senate to be assigned to the Committee on Agriculture and Forestry and on Government Operations, his first assignment in the Senate, and participation in the counting of electoral votes for President of the United States.

Sen. Huddleston said he was "particularly pleased" with his Committee assignments, since they would enable him to participate in deliberations on many issues of importance to the people of Kentucky and to help formulate policy in these areas.

Both the Agriculture Committee and the Committee on Government Operations promise to be active Committees this year. And, both will be covered with new organization plans, the Kentucky Senator said.

The Chairman of the Agriculture and Forestry Committee has already announced that the Committee will hold through hearings on a variety of recent Administration cutbacks in farm and rural programs, such as termination of the Rural Electrification Assistance Program (REAP), formerly Agriculture Conservation Programs, the discontinuation of expert subsidies on tobacco and revision of the Rural Electrification Program.

The Government Operations Committee will be reorganized executive agencies and with the impoundment of funds, i.e., the refusal of the Executive branch to spend funds appropriated by Congress. Impoundment or the withholding of appropriated funds threatened Kentucky highway projects last year and has resulted in major reductions in other programs of importance to the people of our State.

I welcome the opportunity to work on these issues and the many other significant ones which will come before these Committees. I believe service on these Committees will enable me to make a contribution to the people I was elected to serve and to the future operations of our system of government.

Kentucky has a proud tradition of public service extending from Sherman Clay to Allen Barkley and John Sherman Cooper. I hope to follow in that tradition and to address myself to those contemporary questions of national concern by the people of our State and nation. These Committee assignments are a good place to begin.

Sen. Huddleston's Committee assignments were announced on Jan. 4, the U.S. Senate for the first time. In fact, Democratic Committee assignments and Hillander Reports for Duty.
