The soil conservation service, working through the local Conservation District still gives technical service for planning, soil information and map drawing assistance in layout and design and construction of ponds, ditches, drainage channels, graded waterways, pipelines and tanks, spring developments, drainage ditches, critical areas pasture and hayland seeding and many others. All this assistance is free for the asking.

They will also help in determining the best tree for different soils, give assistance on wildlife that may be grown locally, help in fishpond stocking and management, and help in suitability management and design of septic tanks.

## Amended trash ordinance passed by City Council

An amended trash ordinance was passed unanimously by City Council in regular meeting Monday night. It raises some businesses and industries, but does not raise rates for individual homes. The raise was made necessary because the City trash collection has been losing money. A list of businesses raised can be found on the classified page of today's Mercury.

Bob Courtney, owner and operator of Courtney's IGA, appeared at the meeting to discuss his request for a building permit to construct a parking lot on the East side of his grocery store. The request was tabled until councilmen could study the site on Tuesday night at 6 p.m. The main consideration is that the alley running beside the store is used quite frequently and contains a City sewer line which Courtney would like to lower in order to make the alley the same

level as a new proposed store entrance. City employees Margaret Wade and Frankie Price were switched from hourly rates to monthly salaries of \$300 per month. This action puts all City full-time permanent employees on monthly rates. All full-time employees will be given one sick day per month, to be accumulated for one year, retroactive to Jan. 1, 1973.

Police Judge Raymond Hall has asked the City for raise in pay. In order to raise an elected official's salary substantially within his term, it must be done by May 1 preceding the election and cannot become effective until the next term of office. Judge Hall presently receives \$100 per month. His decision to run for reelection could heavily depend upon increased pay of May 1. It was stated that the Police Court work load has greatly increased during his term of office, and that he is frequently called out at all hours of the night. Council will act on this issue at a later date, but before May 1, it was agreed.

Water Plant employees Oliver Vice and Lester Stapp will alternate working on weekends. They will be off on the Thursday and Friday preceding. Both will work the first three days of each week.

Council voted to install a light between the intersection of Catherine Street and Eastern Avenue and the First Christian Church.

## Industry request denied by Bourbon Zoning Commission

The Bourbon County Joint Planning and Zoning Commission last week turned down Blue Grass Industries request to rezone a site on the Lexington Road, throughout the nation. Their job will be to distribute heart-saving information among friends and neighbors.

Since 1959 there has been a decline of about 21 per cent in the death rate from heart and blood vessel diseases for persons below the age of 65, the campaign chairman reported. "But despite achievements in combating the nation's number-one health problem, greater effort is essential to reduce the death and disability which result from heart and blood vessel diseases. "This is the purpose of our Heart Fund Campaign and the mission of the Heart Fund volunteer who will call during Heart Month," the campaign chairman said.

## \$775 goal set by local Heart Association

A goal of \$775 has been set for the 1973 fund drive of the Nicholas County Heart Association to reduce deaths from heart and blood vessel diseases. According to H. Dallas Sugg, Heart Fund campaign chairman, these diseases kill more people than all other causes combined.

Citing the epidemic scale of the problem, the chairman said, "Heart and blood vessel diseases affect one out of every eight Americans and will claim more than a million lives this year, 30 per cent of all deaths in the U.S."

The Heart Fund drive will be conducted during February which has been designated Heart Month by an Act of Congress. Theme of the 1973 campaign attack will be "Beat the Big One-Heart attack." The nation's number-one killer, heart attack, will claim an estimated 675,000 lives this year.

During Heart Month, more than 100 volunteers in Nicholas County will join a nationwide campaign to raise two million throughout the nation. Their job will be to distribute heart-saving information among friends and neighbors.

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
