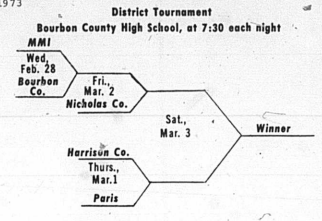
SHERMAN LAWRENCE

agricultural workers and the cooperative's retail agency personnel.

Presiding at the meeting will be Hayward B. Hill of South Charleston, W. Va., a member of the cooperative's 15-man board of directors. Hill represents the cooperative's members in southwestern West Virginia and eastern Kentucky. He has been a member of the board since 1966.

Mullins will be assisted by Jack A. McHugh, manager Operations Research, Fertilizer Division of the cooperative. They will answer questions about the cooperative's operations and services, legislation and governmental policies.

During his report, Mullins will look at the Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA), the Environmental Protection Act, consumer protection legislation, exports and imports, wage price controls farm program legislation and Food and Drug Administration regulations. Special emphasis will be given to how legislation and policy will affect farming and farmer operations.

A total of 18 of these regional meetings will be held by Southern States Cooperative over a five state area. The cooperative serves more than 230,000 farmer members who live in Virginia, West Virginia, Maryland, Delaware and Kentucky.

Following lunch, local board and stockholder committee chairmen, who head 100% attendance groups when the session is called to order, will give the cooperative's 20th anniversary commemorative awards.
