TIME FOR SELF-RELIANCE. In an effort to fill his inaugural wish for a society geared to individual self-reliance, President Nixon is making long-overdue plans to eliminate many federal subsidy programs. It has been forecast that the administration will take an initial step in the area of housing, rural assistance, education, and public employment.

Some weeks ago, the President took a commendable first step when he eliminated the federally subsidized 1-pew cent loan for electric cooperatives, a leftover from the New Deal era. The Coops have loaned for credit, but other citizens, who have to pay considerably more for interest when they borrow money, are likely to be pleased that the coops at long last will be required to come somewhat closer to paying their way like everyone else.

Kentucky afield

In early March perhaps being in the "blast-off" in Kentucky. Water and weather conditions being to improve for both fish and fishermen. In fact, one might say that both become more active. The fish are likely to be in the fisherman, but they will be in the fisherman's hands.

Many types of fishing are beginning to "happen" at this time. There's still fishing for bass, catfish, suckers, etc., in streams, using worms and night-crawlers; and fishing in farm ponds, especially for bass, bluegill, crappie, or even crappie. Major lake fishermen, too, are taking their fair share of game fish, especially with minnows and night-crawlers.

Of all fishing that occurs in spring three types create the most excitement among fishermen: fishing for black bass; fishing for white bass during the spring spawning runs and fishing for crappie.

The first type, fishing for black bass, is practiced in one form or another on all major lakes and even in small lakes and ponds. It is in the major lakes, however, that the fisherman will find the most exciting fishing.

When the waters are murky to muddy, jig fishermen usually, small their boats near the shoreline and jig live or artificial baits. In fact, it is 24 inches below the surface. Staff can be used for glass jugs, 12 to 14 feet long, etc.

Best jigging areas are around bluff, stump lines, or out-crops of rocks. In fact, wherever there is cover and a likely fish chase. Jugging is a skill developed only by determined and dedicated anglers.
