

Nicholas squeaks again, advances to finals

Nicholas County gained sweet revenge for the second time in as many consecutive meetings, defeating the Mt. Olivet Black Devils and earning a berth in the final game of the Augusta Invitational Tourney, opposite host Augusta. Having already whipped Silver Grove in the Tourney opener, the Jackets have now avenged two losses. The County was defeated by both Mt. Olivet and Silver Grove in regular season play and has beaten them both in the Augusta Tourney by a combined total of four points.

Mt. Olivet was a 15 point favorite, but led by only a single point at the end of the

first half. The Black Devils were a veteran ball team, starting three seniors, including Danny Linnville, who led all scorers with 19.

Nicholas caught Mt. Olivet early in the final quarter and quickly opened to a seven point lead at 47-40. The Jackets hardly had time to congratulate themselves, when serious foul troubles began to plague them. Coach Bill Anderson lost the services of Doug Fryman, Doug Darbo, and Gerald Hatton in that order, late in the quarter. Fryman made his exit with five minutes to play. Darbo sat out the last two, and Hatton missed a minute. The Black Devils took advantage of Bill Anderson's substitutes and employed a pressing

defense to notch the score at 49 all with only 40 seconds left.

Fryman popped in a crucial 15 point jumper. Danny Linnville countered immediately with a three-point jumper to wrap it up again at 51 all. Then came Doug Jones' amazing saving miracle. Jones took the in-bounds pass, dribbled quickly to Mt. Olivet's five second line and flung loose a 60-foot "hoge shot" that banked in perfectly at the buzzer, assuring him and his teammates a spot in the championship game.

Nicholas shot poorly, hitting on only 35% of its field goal attempts. Fortunately Mt. Olivet fell little better, with a meager 38%.

Doug Fryman led a balanced Jackets scoring attack with 18, followed by Hatton and Jones with 10 apiece and Doug Darbo with eight. Hatton led in rebounding, with nine while Fryman grabbed eight.

Jones was the real hero of the game, however, as besides sinking the electric game-winning bucket, he poured in eight of his ten points late in the fourth quarter. Nicholas County (53); Fryman 18, Hatton 10, Darbo 8, Bromag 4, Compton 3, Kelly.

Jackets gain semis, whip Silver Grove 61-59

The Nicholas County Bluejackets overcame their altitude woes once again with the Silver Grove Spartans at one game, upsetting the same five Groves that whipped the Countians by six less than a week before.

It was another close one, going right into the wire, where it took two consecutive free throws by Gerald Hatton with only three seconds left on the clock, to tie the victory. Rod Remley threw up a thirty foot desperation shot that careered off the front on the rim at the buzzer, and Silver Grove was eliminated from the Augusta Invitational Tournament.

After trailing most of the first quarter, Silver Grove began to rely on their biggest advantage, that of size, and gave every indication of once again methodically rebounding and shuttling the Jackets into the ground. County was held outside by the Groves' 2-3 zone defense, featuring the two big boys, Mike Hedges and Tom Clift and little 5' 7" hustling playmaker Handy Nelson. The Jackets were forced to take the outside shot which, rarely fell, but was aided by Doug Fryman's manman underneath, they more often than not had their shots instantly rejected right back

into their faces by Hedges and Clift. Hedges sat out much of the second quarter with foul problems, but Remley, Nelson, and Clift hardly noticed his absence as they held together a six point lead until the half, which ended 30-20. Play in the first half was very ragged loose a lot of body contact and poor shooting.

Nicholas cut the Groves lead to one at 44-37 with less than two minutes left in the third quarter. The tie rally was won by Doug Fryman's manman rebounding war and the deadly outside gunning of sophomore Doug Darbo, who tossed in two consecutive fifteen foot swishers.

The whistles blew loud and often throughout the quarter as Hatton, Hedges, and Clift all started the fourth with three fouls. The Groves led at the end of the third by four, at 41-37.

The Jackets got a valuable break as Clift acquired his fourth and fifth personal fouls while blocking layups by Fryman and Hatton respectively. Clift sat out the last five minutes and with Hatton forced to play loosely with four fouls of his own, the momentum began to sway toward Nicholas.

Silver Grove seemed to have the boost it needed from Nelson's layup — converted — and Clift's twenty footer bank shot. Nicholas bounced right back however, and had a chance to take over the lead at 50-47, but Fryman was charged for travelling. From here on out Silver Grove sealed its own doom. Nelson hit only one foul

shot and Nicholas set up in offensive court where Darbo threw a ten footer with only thirty seconds left. Hedges rebounded and then threw the ball away. Raymond Compton alertly recovered and gave Doug Jones a pass which he courted to Doug Fryman. Fryman promptly drove in and sank the tying layup. The Groves muffed again on an errant pass sailed out of bounds, giving Nicholas possession with two seconds left. Gerald Hatton drove in and took a very poor shot, but succeeded in drawing Hedges' fifth personal foul.

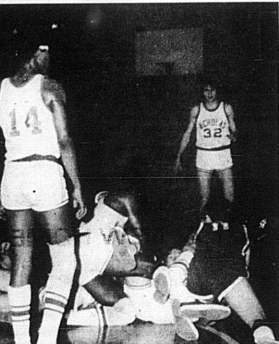
The rest was history as Hatton converted both free throws to give Nicholas County the 61-59 win and a berth in the semifinals against Mt. Olivet Deming.

Once again, the Jackets were led by Gerald Hatton in rebounds with 13, and points, with 23. Doug Fryman followed with ten rebounds and 19 points. Hatton scored 13 of his team's 17 scores in the final quarter, when he began to move inside against the foul-placed Clift and Hedges.

Surprisingly neither Hedges or Clift was high point man for the Groves. Sophomore forward Rod Remley paced his club with 22 points.

It is ironic to notice that Silver Grove's margin of victory two weeks ago came on six free throws. Then Nicholas shot less than 30% from the line. The second time around Nicholas won on free throws. Silver Grove managed only 40% from the line.

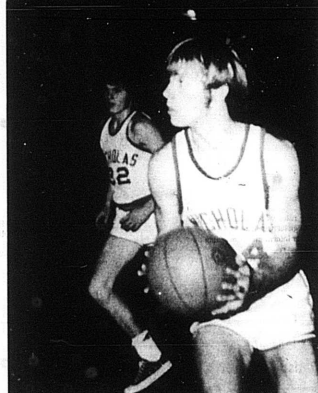

Jackets lose to Silver Grove before tournament starts

The Nicholas County Bluejackets extended their latest losing streak to three games, dropping a 60-45 decision to Silver Grove. It was close all the way, with Silver Grove managing to stay in front most of the time.

Coach Bill Anderson drew up a sagging 2-3 defense to contend with the Groves' two big men, Mike Hedges and Tom Clift. The plan was not very effective, however, and the Silver Grove guards possessed still more problems with some

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OSHA eases recordkeeping for small employers

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) has adopted a proposal to ease recordkeeping and reporting requirements for employers with fewer than eight employees.

Area Director P.P. Flanagan of the Occupational Safety and Health Administration office, said the amendments introduced under the Williams Steiger Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970 will become effective January 1, 1973.

It applies to employers with no more than seven employees at any one time with the calendar year. Those employers will not be required to maintain a log of occupational injuries and illnesses, a supplementary record of each individual job injury or illness, or an annual summary of such incidents.

They will be required only to report fatalities or multiple hospitalization accidents within 48 hours.

Brunswick A. Bagdon, regional director of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Atlanta, indicated that the change will not affect the statistics his bureau compiles under the Act. A list of the names of affected employers will be required to maintain a log, one of three records maintained by each employer and to submit an annual report. These employers will be notified by mail of their exemption.

George C. Guenther, Assistant Secretary of Labor for Occupational Safety and Health, Washington, D.C., said that interested persons were provided 30 days to submit written comments on this proposal, and that after considering the comments, he decided to adopt the amendment to ease the recordkeeping burden on those who operate small businesses.

He said he ordered the delay in the effective date so the Bureau of Labor Statistics could complete a survey of the job injury and illness data.

Guenther also said that the new rules are not intended to affect the submission of records under state law for the keeping of records relating to job safety and health.

He said states may require record-keeping by employers exempt by the new rules "as long as the state obtains the information involved with a minimum burden on employers, especially those operating small businesses."

The new rules were published in the Federal Register Oct. 4.

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State Barrow

Show Jan. 17 at Paris Stockyards

The Kentucky Department of Agriculture will open its 1973 Barrow show program in January with the traditional Bluegrass Barrow Show at Paris, State Agriculture Commissioner Wendell P. Butler said that the on-foot show will be held in the afternoon of Jan. 17, with the evening and weighing of animals to begin at 8 a.m. in the morning at the Paris Stockyards.

The annual awards banquet will be held on the evening of an 22 at the Bourbon County High school.

Along with announcing the date of the 1973 show, Butler also reported on a wage change made in the show. He said that in this year, only two divisions will be for youth and adult.

In previous years, separate divisions were offered a commercial, purebred and youth divisions.

The Paris show is one of four barrow shows sponsored by the Kentucky Department of Agriculture on an alternate basis. The remaining shows are the West county at Murray on March 6 and 7; Central Kentucky at Campbellville, March 26; and the Pennington Barrow show on July 18, at Hopkinsville.

Butler encouraged wide producers to participate in the show in their area, saying they give a producer the opportunity of having his animals judged in competition with other animals on the basis of current marketing standards. No advance entry necessary to participate in the show, and additional information is available on the Division of Shows and Pairs, Kentucky Department of Agriculture, 124 Tower, Frankfort, 40601.
