Nicholas County business increases significantly

NEW YORK—Just how much the Nicholas County economy has moved forward in the last few years, despite the nation's domestic problems, may be ascertained from a look at the record books. They show that the volume of retail business done in the local area, a principal indicator of the state of the economy, rose significantly in the five years ending Jan. 1, 1972.

The gain was made in the face of general apprehension about unemployment, crime conditions, racial strife, swelling welfare rolls, inflation, the war and higher taxes.

The progress made in the local area in the period is revealed in figures compiled by the Standard Rate and Data Service. They show that retail sales in Nicholas County stores, as of the beginning of this year, reached an annual rate of over

City gets balance of \$10,723 federal revenue sharing check

Mayor Bill Power announced at regular council meeting Monday night that the second revenue sharing check in the amount of \$10,723 had been received by the city of Carlisle for the year 1972. The first check was in the amount of \$5,472.

City Council voted 5-0 (Richard Hand was absent because of illness) to put the check into a savings account until a decision can be made as to how the money can best be spent. The group will meet on Monday, Jan. 22, to decide how best to spend the total revenue sharing money. The Nicholas County Library has requested by letter that it be designated some revenue money to be used toward paying its capital indebtedness of \$13,000. Also to be discussed at the Jan. 22 meeting is the city's trash collection which is losing between \$30 to \$50 per month. Trash collection charges will of necessity be raised if it was stated.

This was equivalent to consumer spending at the rate of \$120 per local household, as compared with the 1966 rate of \$163 per household. The rise was greater than that recorded in many parts of the country. It amounted to 18 percent.

Fundamental to the growth in retail activity in the local area during the five-year span was the marked increase in real income achieved by most families.

It has been on an upward curve, more than compensating for the rising cost of living, due to tax hikes, bigger grocery and rent bills and soaring medical costs. Nationally, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the cost of living has gone up 23 percent since 1966, but weekly wages have climbed by about 44 percent.

Figures for Nicholas County show that personal income in the area, after deduction for taxes, went from \$10,627,000 in 1967 to \$17,300,000 in five years. Compared to this increase, 49 percent, the rise in the United States was 48 percent.

With more money at their command, consumers are spending more freely now than they have for some time. They are, by the same token, saving less. As a result, merchants are ringing up record sales.
