NOTICES OF FARM FEED GRAIN CLASSES
Wheat Allowances and yields for the 1972 program are being mailed to growers by the Nicholas County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office, reports Committee Chairman Harvey Waggoner. This is in preparation of the survey of the 1973 Program which will begin on Feb. 5 and continue through March 15.

Farmers should take good look at the official notice as soon as it is received, Mr. Waggoner said. If a farmer believes a mistake has been made in figuring his yields or bases or he feels he has been treated unfairly, he has 15 days from the date on the Notice to file a written request for reconsideration with the County Office. "If a farmer has any questions he should get in touch with the ASCS Office as soon as possible," Mr. Waggoner stated. "If he wants the ASCS Committee to reconsider he must file this request in writing within the time limit.

MANUFACTURING MILK PRODUCTION UNDERWAY
A program to promote and implement greater production of manufacturing milk has been officially launched in Kentucky.
The program is being spearheaded by the Manufacturing Milk Development Committee, comprised of representatives from the industry, the Department of Agriculture, and the University of Kentucky. This committee was organized following several meetings at which the need for more milk for manufacturing purposes was outlined.

A primary use of manufacturing milk as cheese, and Kentucky ranks 25th nationally in the production of American cheese. Plants in Kentucky say they use twice the amount of milk they are currently receiving—if this supply could be spread over a 12-month production period. Because of this, and because of the increased demand that is expected for cheese products, those involved with this program are optimistic about its potential.
There are currently 18 manufacturing plants in Kentucky and 9 manufacturing milk receiving stations in the State. These facilities employ 800-plus workers representing a payroll in excess of \$1.5 million annually. As a rule, these plants are located in less-industrialized communities, making their employment

Feed Grain, Wheat programs to begin

The programs have been altered since their first announcement in July. The first major change is the elimination of the required set aside acres for the wheat program. This will not affect any payment to the Wheat Program more wheat to be produced. The farmer who wants additional set aside must set aside the minimum.
Another change has been the provision that allows a farmer to pasture the set aside acres all year long, for a small reduction in payment. In previous years, farmers were not allowed to pasture the set aside during the five principal growing months of the year. This provision is to give the farmer an additional source of livestock feed and to encourage the production of livestock.
