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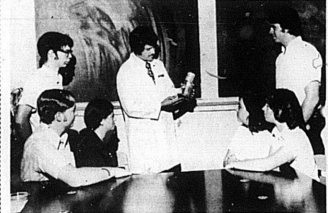
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Comie Harris, Olive Hill senior, is the student director of MSSU's project, entitled "Detecting Aflatoxin Producing Strains of Aspergillus Flavus in Soil and Corn Samples."
"Since these aflatoxin-producing fungi have been discovered in corn and are harmful to livestock, this study is being conducted in an effort to determine distribution in the main corn producing areas of Kentucky and to make the farmer aware of the potential problem of aflatoxin-contaminated corn," Miss Harris said.

The \$8,800 grant was the only SOS grant awarded to a Kentucky institution.

The research team has been conducting a survey to detect the presence of aflatoxin-producing strains of the fungi in soil and corn samples gathered from selected counties in Western and Eastern Kentucky.
Soil and grain samples were collected from corn fields and storage areas in the Kentucky counties. County agents were consulted in helping select farms for sampling.
The group's findings will be included in a research paper to be presented in December to the National Science Foundation in Washington, D.C.

Commercial tax preparer convicted on eight counts
Louisville—After one and one half day trial in United States District Court here at Paducah recently convicted John W. Bostick, 41, Paducah, a commercial tax return preparer of eight counts of preparation of false and fraudulent tax returns for his clients. U.S. District Court Judge Charles M. Allen sentenced Bostick to a concurrent term of one year and one day on each of the counts.
Bostick was arrested on the charges on April 6 by special agents of Internal Revenue Service Intelligence Division and indicted by Federal grand jury at Paducah June 11 this year.
Bostick could have received a sentence of up to three years and a fine of \$5,000 on each of the counts. The investigation leading to Bostick's conviction was conducted by Tax Auditors of Internal Revenue Service Audit Division and special agents of the Intelligence Division.

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
