Which drug is more effective in lowering fever— aspirin or acetylsalicylic acid? Both are about the same in fever-reducing effectiveness. A study showed that a combination of aspirin and acetylsalicylic acid had more fever-reducing effectiveness than using either drug alone. Researchers at the Temple Army Medical Center also indicated that a dose of this combination was required every 4 hours instead of the "usual" every 6 hours.

Are you considered deaf if you can hear sounds like music or people talking, but you cannot understand what is being said? I have been told that a hearing aid will not help. A.S.

An audiologist told me that your type of deafness can be helped with the newest hearing aids. Contact your local hearing and speech center.

In the concentration of sugar in liquid medicines very high? N.B.

They are not! Some 50 to 90 per cent of the volume can be dissolved sugar. A teaspoonful of medicine could have an equivalent of half a cube of sugar. My 3 in 1 Guide would show you what liquid medicines are low or free of sugar. If you are on a low carbohydrate (sugar) and calorie diet, this guide could be very helpful. Yes, and the results seem encouraging. A medical team from a Michigan hospital used gold salts on patients for two years. The treatment retarded progression of rheumatoid arthritis in some, while others were freed of all symptoms of the disease.

What is a monologic application? J.G.

There is no such thing as a "monologic" cosmetic. Any substance applied to the skin could have the potential of causing an allergy. Certain cosmetics are considered hypo-allergenic, because their ingredients are less likely to cause an allergy.

A favorite question: Where to buy supplies wholesale for the crafts or other products you make to sell? Often, fellow craftspersons or magazines supply the supplier answer. Many how-to books list suppliers in the back, but these are generally located on the east or west coast and aren't always wholesale.

Another approach to finding suppliers of ANYTHING is slumming in standard business directories. Go to your library and look in "Thomas Register of American Manufacturers" and "Who's Who in Business." If you don't find what you want in one of those, look in "Guide to American Directories," which is the directories' directory.

Once you locate appropriate manufacturers, write to them asking about prices and minimum orders; however, will think your business potatoes are too small to bother with, and will probably suggest a wholesaler near you.

To buy wholesale, you may have to produce a "credit number" which you get when you register your business venture with the city, county or state agencies in your locale which use registration for the purpose of collecting sales taxes. The wholesaler privileges a business resale license cards are well worth its cost.

Two cautions! Don't blow your savings on materials or equipment until you've determined your product will sell (test the market). Don't spring on inventory just because you can buy wholesale. Products and materials change, as do customer's tastes, and you don't want to be stuck with too much of a dated thing.
