Rep. Perkins urges officials to seek funds

Local officials in the Seventh District should apply for recently released Neighborhood Youth Corps funds as soon as possible, Rep. Carl Perkins of Kentucky said.

More than \$6 million has been allocated to the state for summer jobs for high school students. The program originally sponsored by Rep. Perkins.

"We have succeeded in getting this money so that our communities can hire more young people who need to work and earn funds which will help them return to school next September," Representative Perkins said.

The U.S. Department of Labor designated the State Office of Economic Opportunity, in Frankfort, headed by Ed Smith, as the proper agency to administer requests for funds to employ

high school youths.

"Our high school students seeking jobs should see their local school officials, and other local officials who have been handling the Neighborhood Youth Corps program," Rep. Perkins said.

Rep. Perkins has been seeking release of the money since the spring, and has made several speeches on the House floor, as well as requests to the Administration, for the funds.

The money had been authorized and appropriated, but the Administration decided to recommit it, leaving thousands of Kentucky youngsters without an opportunity for a summer job.

The Manpower Administration of the U.S. Department of Labor released the money after litigation and Congressional efforts to secure the funds for summer jobs.

Local National Guard unit helps convert Muhlenberg site

Somebody is doing something nice for Muhlenberg County, Ky. That somebody is the Kentucky Army National Guard's 20th Engineer Battalion. Members of the battalion's Company B are spending the first week of their annual training exercises at the National Guard Boy Camp area and the Weekend Training Site in the western portion of the state.

Company B, normally a split unit operating out of Olive Hill and Carlisle, is united for land clearing and repair operations. The 130 men will construct a range control tower. In three years the engineers have converted a 30-acre undeveloped site in Muhlenberg county into land with a dual purpose. It serves western Kentucky armor companies as a national guard training ground for weekend drills. And each summer the site is used for the KYARNG Youth Activities project, supported by volunteer manpower and fundraising projects by guardians.

Battalion Commander Lieutenant Colonel Robert L. Dearnan said the men of Company B will spend the second week of their "summer camp" in Frankfort, where they will join three other companies already working on construction of a small dam and lake at the Boone National Guard Center. That site is being reduced for nearly 24-million dollars of construction work to provide a new Frankfort armory, an Organizational Maintenance Shop, and a state Emergency Operations Center.
