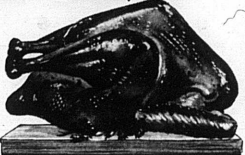

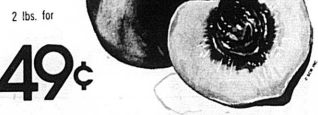

With so many good summer salads, I just couldn't get them all in one column. And I am sure that there are lots of summer days left. So add these to your list.

FROZEN FRUIT CHEESE SALAD

1 1/2 cup cream cheese
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/8 teaspoon salt
1 cup pineapple tidbits
1 cup miniature marshmallows
1 cup chopped pecans
1 cup cherries, dark or light, pitted
1 banana, sliced
1 cup mayonnaise
2 cups whipping cream, whipped
Blend the cheese, cream, lemon juice, and salt until smooth. Add pineapple, marshmallows, nuts, cherries and banana. Stir mayonnaise into whipped cream and fold into mixture. Freeze and slice to serve. Should serve 12.

SHRIMP COCKTAIL RING

1 can tomato soup, undiluted
8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
8 pkg. lemon jelly
1 cup mayonnaise
1 cup water
1 cup grated onion (use mild onion)
1 cup chopped celery
1 lb. cooked shrimp, cut up
Bring tomato soup to boiling point. Add cream cheese and mayonnaise. Soften jelly in hot water and add to mixture. Cool. Add shrimp with a little mayonnaise for easy removal.
Spoon mixture into ring mold. Leave overnight. Keep in hand and use two or three cans of shrimp. It is also more economical.

TUNA-MACARONI SALAD

This makes a salad for a crowd, but can easily be cut in half.
1 - 10 oz. pkg. macaroni, cooked
1 - 10 oz. can tuna, drained
1/2 cup celery, chopped (I think more celery is good)
1/4 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
Combine all ingredients. Toss in refrigerator several minutes. Taste for seasoning. You may want to add mayonnaise or pickle. This is a good salad to be served warm. If you have more than one cup of ham increase ingredients proportionately.

HAM AND VEGETABLE SALAD

1 cup chopped cooked ham
1 cup (8 oz. can) small peas, drained
1/2 cup cooked carrots, chopped not too fine
1/2 cup chopped raw apple
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup chopped cucumber pickle
1 use sweet pickle relish
1 teaspoon lemon juice
Blend all ingredients. Taste for seasoning. Put in refrigerator to chill. This is a good salad to be served warm. If you have more than one cup of ham increase ingredients proportionately.

PARTY SALAD

1 cup milk
1 tablespoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon cornstarch
1/2 teaspoon vinegar
1 egg yolk, beaten
1 can seeded tart cherries, drained
1 can crushed pineapple, drained
1/2 pound miniature marshmallows
1/2 cup whipping cream
Cook salad dressing ingredients together, stirring constantly. Cool. Mix salad with dressing and let stand overnight. Mix with whipped cream when ready to serve. Will serve 10.
